Budget Priorities

Health and Human Services

- Restore funding for Community Health Clinics to 2014 levels by reauthorizing the Health Center Fund in the Affordable Care Act.
- Ensure maintenance of public health funding streams.
- Support funding for the Defending Childhood and Promise Neighborhood Initiatives, the formula-funded youth programs in the Workforce Investment Opportunity Act and Safe Routes to School.
- Support continued funding for Community Development and Community Services Block Grants as well as the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program.
- Support Promise Zone designation for the Rockwood area of Gresham.
- Identify discretionary grants and support applications submitted throughout the year that are central to the County's strategic vision and mission.

Infrastructure

- Support additional funding for levee accreditation and repairs through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.
- Support increased funding for Environmental Protection Agency grants to restore contaminated brownfields.
- Support Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) funding at or above 2014 levels to sustain emergency preparedness for the Portland Metro Region.



Policy Priorities

Health

• End the cost shift to local taxpayers by allowing Medicaid and VA reimbursement of medical care to individuals incarcerated in county jails.

Veterans

- Remove obstacles to housing for veterans by increasing flexibility of VASH vouchers to include deposits and utilities.
- Extend duration of eligibility for Supportive Services for Veterans Families to 24 months to reflect the need for sustained and more in-depth assistance to ensure long-term success.

Children and Families

• Strengthen federal family leave policies in order to support children and families, as well as the economy.

Affordable Housing

 Protect the National Housing Trust Fund and the decision of the Federal Housing Finance Agency to set aside revenues for the trust fund.

Prevention Investments

• Support "Pay for Success" policy initiatives by assuring access to start up funding and technical assistance necessary for success.

Infrastructure

- Support continuation of the Highway Trust Fund including stand-alone funding for bridge maintenance and repair and reauthorization of the TIGER discretionary grant program.
- Avoid unnecessary cost increases in public infrastructure projects by maintaining the longstanding tax treatment of interest on municipal bonds.
