25+ Years of Reform

1992 Became Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative (JDAI) site, focused on reducing reliance on secure detention

lmplemented Functional Family Probation, focused on engaging, motivating and working successfully with youth and their families.

2011 Launched the Community Healing Initiative in partnership with culturally specific organizations

2020 Designing Probation Transformation efforts AS PART OF ongoing JDAI commitment

Two Key Pillars:

DIVERSION for more youth because most youth grow out of delinquent behavior without any intervention

PROBATION for youth who pose a significant risk for serious offending without more guidance and support

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Local Data:


Youth of Color are Underrepresented in DIVERSION

- 50% White, 28% Black, 19% Latinx

Youth of Color are Overrepresented in PROBATION

- 76% Youth of Color (51% Black, 16% Latinx)





Goal 1 - Expand Diversion

Enhance, expand & align our diversion pathways with community-led solutions that prioritize healing and meaningful accountability

Goal 2 - Decrease Conditions

Reduce the overall number of court-ordered conditions with a focus on individualizing conditions specific to the needs

Goal 3 - Increase Incentives

Increase juvenile court counselor's ability to promote positive behavior change through the use of incentives and identifying and building on youth & families' strengths












Referrals & Detention Admissions







Average # of Beds Used Per Day by Month






Detention Admission Decision-Making



4/1/2020 - 10/31/2021






Detention Admission Policy and Statutory Holds



Average LOS in Days by Calendar Year






Senate Bill 1008

Passed by the 2019 Legislature; Effective Date = 1/2/2020


- Ends the automatic adult prosecution of 15-, 16- and 17-year-olds for Measure 11 (M11) offenses; authorizes adult prosecution for M11 offenses after the court holds a "waiver hearing."
- For youth who are waived to adult court and sentenced under M11:
 - Authorizes a conditional release hearing (known as a "second-look hearing") for youth who have served half of their M11 sentence.
 - Authorizes a conditional release hearing (known as a "transfer hearing") for youth sentenced to a term of imprisonment for a crime committed when the person was under 18 years of age if the person's release date falls between the person's 25th and 27th birthdays.
 - Prohibits the imposition of a life sentence without the possibility of parole for youth, creates youth sentencing criteria, and authorizes a parole hearing after 15 years of imprisonment for persons sentenced for a crime committed when the person was under 18 years of age.
- Requires District Attorney's offices to provide trauma-informed and culturally specific notice, and where available, services for victims.








Waivers to Adult Criminal Court
