Multhomah County had to come up with a cumbersome way to help fill in the gaps due to the statewide system being so inaccessible The Chair specifically asked for MCPHAB to weigh in on this decision 0 Ethics conversations are not a yes/no 0 Purpose is to provide feedback, which will be elevated and used during the decision-making process The board deliberated on the following question: • What are the equity impacts of a vaccine verification program, taking into consideration vaccination rates amongst BIPOC communities? When we're creating policies, we need to consider historical context . o Policies are steered around white supremacy o Think about all of the policies impacting communities Looking at the larger scope: Large Group o People might not know about the vaccine, or have reasons for not wanting to All Deliberation receive the vaccine. When we enter spaces where vaccines are mandated, want to be culturally sensitive Thinking in the vein of messaging to someone who has deficits in sensory perception . o How would we relay the information to them that is culturally sensitive and clear? How do we relay that vaccine mandates are in everyone's best interest for protecting • public health? o Heard stories about people who wore masks, provided proof of entry, then took off

the mask after participating in the event	
<ul> <li>Some businesses are already enforcing vaccine requirements</li> </ul>	
o Just asking for pictures or card evidence	
o Honor system - fairly easy to forge cards	
• Systems and databases - how do we verify that someone is who they said they are?	
o We use identification	
o At this point, we're using vaccine cards as ID - treading a fine line with HIPAA	
o Should continue to lobby for a federal database; it's unfair that local jurisdictions	
should have to foot the bill	
<ul> <li>We could do a little more deep diving to lobby upward, and not locally</li> <li>More intimidating to ask business supers to ask for IDs</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>More intimidating to ask business owners to ask for IDs</li> <li>There are different levels that we have to consider</li> </ul>

o I would think legally they are unable to prevent people from entering - ADA

o Good question - in practice, this could be challenging	
Folks can potentially have anaphylaxis reactions to all of the available COVID vaccines	
o Even though the populations are going to be small, we should consider those	
unable to be vaccinated based on medical advice	
o According to other jurisdictions, businesses would have to make accommodations	
for people with medical and religious exemptions

<ul> <li>Would need to grapple with this policy question, as we don't have a similar</li> </ul>	
requirement

<ul> <li>Timeline: if it moves ahead, they would like it to be implemented in the next few months</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Canada also uses an app that you can upload verification into</li> </ul>	
o If you're visiting, it can tell you if you were in contact with someone who had

• Would the app only be for vaccine verification? Or would contact tracing elements be built	
in?	
<ul> <li>Have only heard that it would be a standalone thing</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Employee vaccination requirement is a really important part of this policy</li> </ul>	
o Patrons dining indoors are taking their masks off, while employees are able to	
remain fully masked	
o Does that change anything around whether employees should also be required to	
be vaccinated?	
Was thinking in terms of the Indoor Clean Air Act	
<ul> <li>Would be a tough one for our jurisdiction, because of the limited employee vaccine mandates in place</li> </ul>	
o Appreciate the points around fair implementation	
<ul> <li>What kind of resources are going to be implemented?</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Creates many opportunities for bad situations that could be avoided with</li> </ul>	
some foresight and investment	
• A lot of pressure on smaller businesses and organizations to take vaccine mandates on	
themselves	
o Would putting a policy in place encourage more people to get vaccinated, or would	
it deter people?	
o Recently seeing an increase in vaccinations, largely because it's been mandated	
by workplaces	
<ul> <li>Would religions be involved in this? They hold places of great influence</li> <li>Moving upstream, it would be helpful to have accountability across the board</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>App attached to a database - if that route is selected, hopefully there will be support for</li> </ul>	
small businesses to have access to that product that isn't undermining their profit margins	
o When businesses are pushing for their patrons to become vaccinated and to be	
honest about vaccine status, we should keep support for the small businesses in	
mind	
• Other jurisdictions all had apps, but also offered the ability to show a card as evidence	
o Recommendation that businesses not have to take on that power	
o Having the app is a pro because it doesn't create more anxiety to put people in	
positions that makes them feel superior to the situation	

	<ul> <li>Having an app that tells people they are exempt, without having to have</li> </ul>
	them explain why they are exempt, is helpful
	<ul> <li>Helps to reduce the need to get in so much information</li> </ul>
	There's a large list of people who are exempt
	<ul> <li>It would be really simple to just log into the app</li> </ul>
•	App would create a digital inequity
	o Would it be on the people themselves to show the app they have, or would they be
	showing the card they have?
	o If we're already in a system with a card, could we just show our card and have
	them add us to the system?
•	What kind of system would we be using?
	o Have you seen the disparity in folks who don't have those kinds of IDs?
	o State system is ALERT database
	o We want to be flexible for those who are undocumented and don't have a photo ID
	<ul> <li>Could show a piece of mail as an alternative</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Or could just use the vaccine cards received when vaccinated, though</li> </ul>
	fraud would be easy
•	How are we going to help those who don't have access to technology, like the houseless
	community?
	o Need to make sure they aren't excluded
	Is there a way that the state could put a sticker on our ID, as another option?
	The app doesn't preclude the other ways you could verify vaccine status
•	o It's the app plus other ways, such as showing vaccine cards
	Presumably one of the benefits would be to encourage people to get vaccinated
•	o Put signage up at restaurants, etc. so that we can support businesses to
	implement the policy
	<ul> <li>Provides information so that folks can get vaccinated and then come back</li> <li>Multiple County could create signage with a OR code to show where to go for</li> </ul>
	o Multhomah County could create signage with a QR code to show where to go for
	vaccines
	<ul> <li>New York is promoting this as a vaccine incentive program - you could go to a</li> </ul>
	concert the night of receiving your first dose
•	It sounds like we're going the direction of an app, instead of moving towards policy; policy
	would put more of the onus on businesses to enforce
	o There does need to be verification of proof, but that needs to be done in a way
	that's not debilitating to the exempt
•	There's a policy around requiring vaccine verification, and then the operational side, which
	includes the development of an app
	o It's a both and
•	App is a way to mitigate equity implications of a policy
٠	Accessibility is a huge potential barrier
	<ul> <li>Opportunity to improve on how things are being done currently</li> </ul>
	o There's room for accessibility improvement
٠	Can we ensure that there's a language communicated to businesses on how a person can
	access their business that's respectful?
	o Need to make sure that we're respectful when telling a person they can't enter
	without proof
•	Health equity implications
	o The policy would result in more people of color being turned away from
	businesses, according to dashboard numbers
	o Need to feel like communities aren't being policed around the efforts
	<ul> <li>There are already a lot of mandates in place</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Estimate that only 50% of people are willing to give information around</li> </ul>
	vaccination
	<ul> <li>A lot of work to be done</li> </ul>
	o Racial and ethnic groups aren't engaged in this policy effort on their own behalf
•	Is a data analyst tracking information?
	o We could bring back more information to MCPHAB; we're tracking a lot of data
	The board is wanting more input on data
	Communication and linguistic barriers need to be overcome
•	Feedback on how we can support all backgrounds - how is that going to impact all of those
-	populations?
•	Comfortable about making suggestions when we have stronger data
	Main concern with the app is the access issue - it does resolve some language issues

	<ul> <li>Getting an Oregon ID is incredibly cumbersome, especially for houseless and folks who are criminal justice involved, they need verification documents that are hard to get a hold of.</li> </ul>
0	<ul> <li>To add, it is hard with COVID to get ID swiftly too</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>App piece can be tricky if you're English language learner, so we may need to partner with communities to do this right</li> <li>Is OHA tracking vaccination rates based on immigration/refugee status?</li> </ul>
