

CBAC Budget Feedback

EMERGING ISSUES & CHANGES

We focused on supporting programs which provide aid to immigrants and refugees, those affected by domestic violence, the housing crisis, and communities of color who experience inequalities in economic opportunities, housing, health care, the justice system, and other areas.

BUDGET FEEDBACK

Our recommendations for DCHS and the County's budget overall is to focus on observation of process, opinions and ideas facing the community. For example:

- Consider other ways that budget feedback can be gathered, particularly from the people who are targeted by Multnomah County's services in a more inclusive way than the current CBAC structure.
- Solicit feedback from community members who don't participate in the County's programs, to understand barriers to access and awareness of the County's services.
- Provide tours of the different programs throughout the year.



CBAC Recommended Program Offers

PROGRAM OFFER PRIORITIES

The DCHS CBAC recognizes the essential services that the County provides as a social safety net for the County's vulnerable residents, particularly in light of the impact of COVID-19 and the inequalities resulting from oppressive systems, both historic and contemporary. Accordingly, our specific priorities are as follows, in order:

- 1. **25138B** YFS Youth Stability & Homelessness Prevention Services Expansion \$600,000 (New Ongoing)
- 2. **25050B** YFS Gateway Center \$113,560; 1.00 FTE (New Ongoing)
- 3. **25049B** YFS Sexual Assault Services \$424,780; 1.00 FTE (New Ongoing)

DCHS centered racial justice and equity in the FY 2023 budgetary decision-making process by asking staff and leadership to consider systemic racial disparities when developing program offers, and by using the Office of Diversity and Equity's FY 2023 Budget Equity Tool.

Applying the Equity Tool in Practice:

What this looked like in practice for DCHS is illustrated by the Aging, Disability & Veterans Services Division's budget equity process which involved a small team of data & evaluation specialists meeting with each program within the division to ensure that programs have a racial equity strategy that is clear and data-driven.




FTE - 5 Year Trend

FTE by Fund




- 112 FTE added in FY22


Budget by Category - \$336,010,424






Budget by Division (\$336,010,424 and 925.40 FTE)





Administration



Medicaid Package Implementation: An increase in Medicaid funding for the State FY 2021-23 biennium allowed ADVSD to add 63 FTE. ADVSD utilized the Equity and Empowerment Lens to allocate this funding, focusing on improving services to culturally diverse communities.





The **Adult Care Home Program** transitions consumers to lower levels of care.

54 residents in Multnomah County
Adult Care Homes, and providers
received \$540,000 in placement
incentives from the State

Diversions

The **Community Services** Care Transition
Team provides resources to consumers
who were recently discharged from
hospitals, to prevent them from being
readmitted into a hospital setting.



This program lowers readmission rates to **13.25**%.

National readmission rates for same cohort are **20%-25%**





Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities



- This budget increase started with the FY22 Budget Modification, and has provided funding for additional positions across the division, with a special focus on service coordination (13 FTE), abuse investigation (10 FTE), plan of care (5 FTE) and intake and eligibility (3 FTE).
- Reduces caseloads to state standards and increases capacity to better meet the health and safety needs of our 4,906 clients (and growing).












Language


IDD clients speak 37 languages. The 7 most frequently spoken languages are:

 About 80% of our certified DD child foster care providers identify as BIPOC. IDDSD recruits, trains and supports child foster care providers.







YFS: Budget by Program Area






- Cooling Support (25121B \$1,270,740)
 - Provide cooling kits and 1,000 portable cooling units to households in east County.
- Woodstove Exchange (25121C \$274,292)
 - Partner with Environmental Health and Office of Sustainability to replace older wood stoves.
- Domestic and Sexual Violence Services (25049B \$424,780)
 - Strengthen the division's support of domestic and sexual violence survivors by working with the DA to prepare for a transition to a Unified Community-Based response to sexual assault.
- Homeshare (25133B \$250,000)
 - Pilot project to support homeowners who are mortgage burdened to find a tenant.
- Refugee Resettlement Support (25136B \$250,000)
 - Supports agencies working with refugees to obtain required medical examination.
- SUN Data Evaluation Services (25160B \$226,466 and 25160C \$95,000)
 - Implement a new data collection system for SUN Community Schools. Funds support the purchase of the system and one additional FTE to support implementation.




YFS Increase in Contracts & Amendments



COVID-19 & American Rescue Plan



- In FY 2022 there was more state COVID dollars – and in FY 2023 those have gone down, but been replaced with direct County ARP dollars.
- Majority of ARP funds used for Eviction Prevention / Emergency Rent Assistance.
- Direct Client Assistance and Multnomah Mother's Trust program is increasing.
