 - Laboratory services

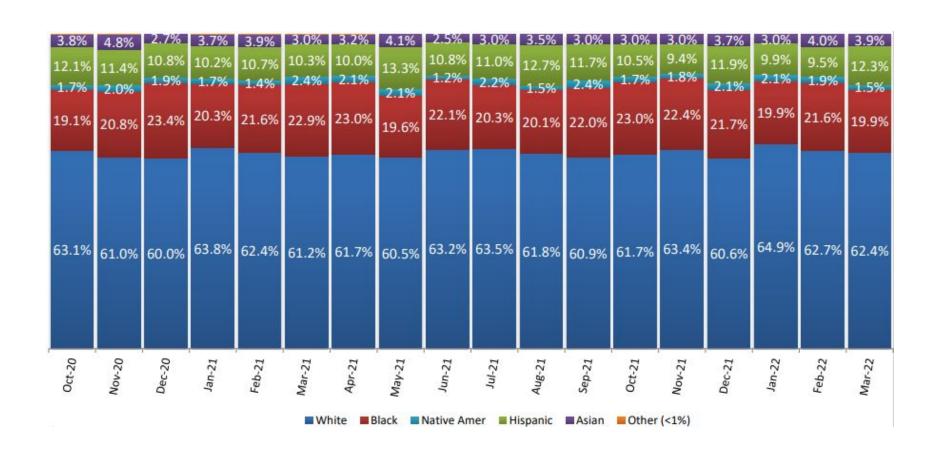


Equity Is A Cornerstone

Addressing Racial Disparities By Facilitating Successful Return to the Community

- The Transition Services Program (TSP) works with individuals in custody to create successful transition plans into their communities.
 - Connection to community services
 - Culturally specific care





COVID-19 Efforts

- Collaborating with the Health Officer,
 Public Health, and MCSO
- Screening for symptoms at booking
- Using rapid antigen testing
- Providing culturally appropriate education
- Vaccinating:
 - 4/27/2022: 61% fully vaccinated;
 70% at least one dose
- Treating COVID-19 on site
- Requiring surgical masks in the medical areas of the facilities



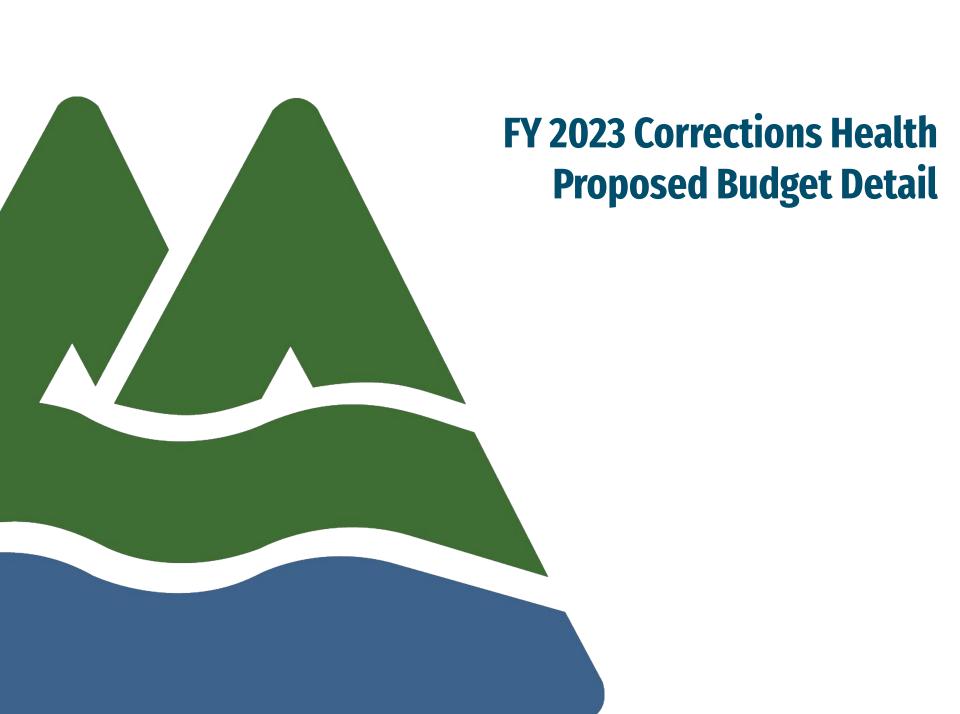


Infrastructure Prioritized in FY 2023

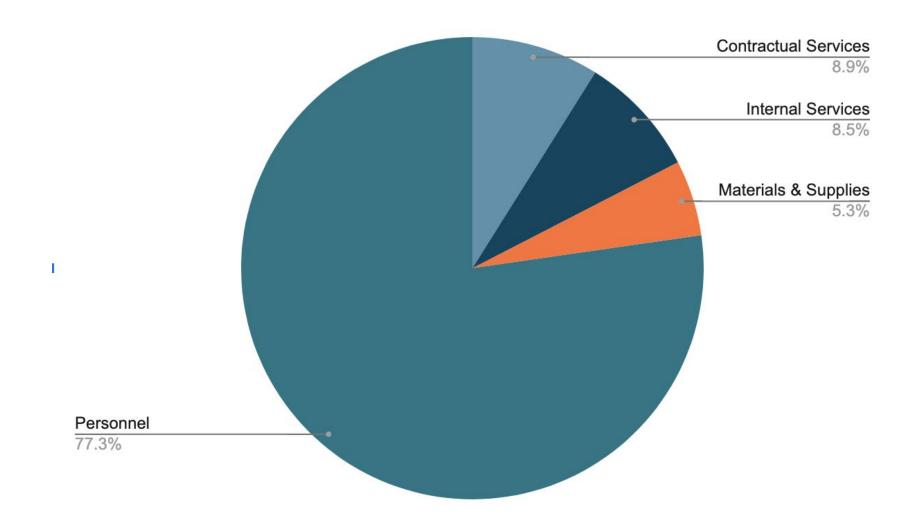
Infrastructure to prioritized to strengthen high quality services

- Quality & Compliance Management
 - New Quality Manager funded within HD constraint
 - Support in maintaining NCCHC Accreditation status
- Enhancements at Juvenile Detention Center
 - 0.80 Nursing Supervisor position to provide permanent support and oversight
 - Dental services for youth now possible, thanks to the electronic health record system (also include dental EHR/Wisdom)





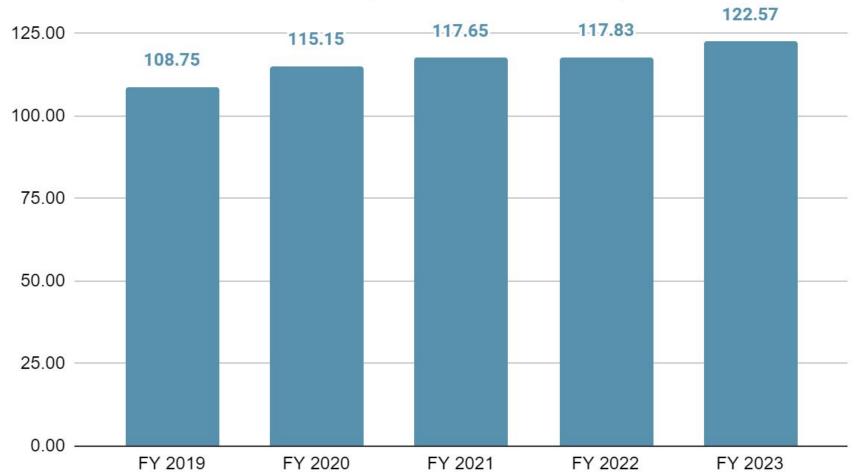
Budget by Category - \$28,294,670





FTE - 5 Year Trend

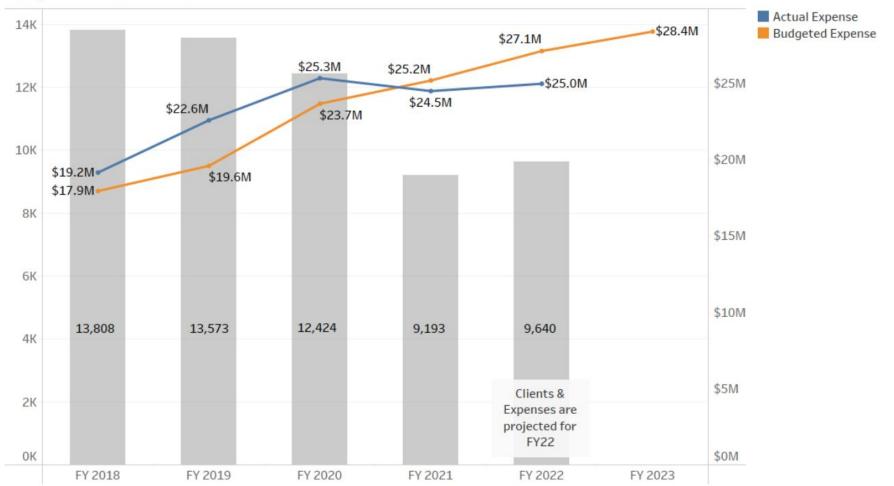






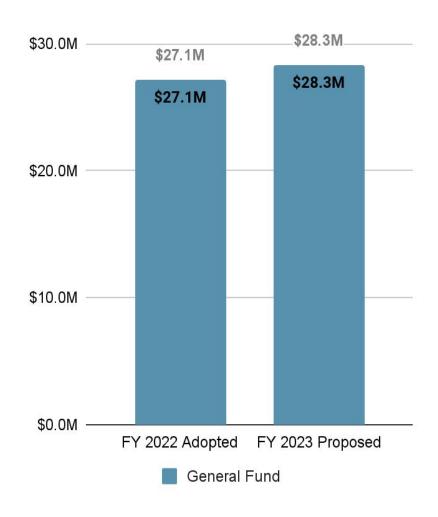
5 Year Trend of Population vs. Budget & Actuals

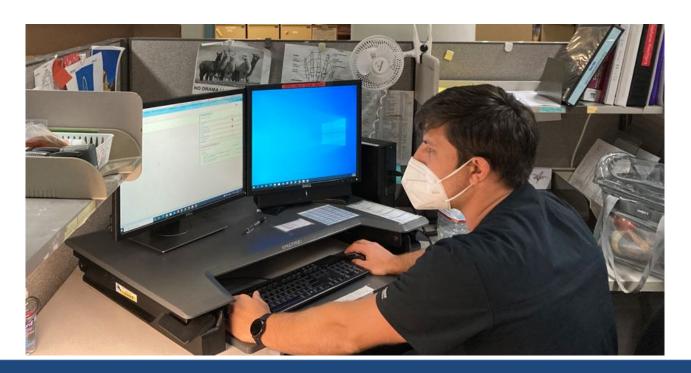


Corrections Health Staffing

- Constitutional requirements lead to mandated overtime

Service Trends Continue to Rise

Services provided have generally remained constant or increased, despite jail population decrease.

- Increase in mental health needs
- Time spent on COVID screenings and prevention efforts more than offset any reduction in intake assessments

Providing person-centered care to high need populations

- Promoting health literacy
- Transition planning and care coordination
