## Funding Available

#### \$5 billion over 5 years from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

- Will be awarding 100s of Action Plan Grants this year
- Action Plan Award Amounts: min \$200,000, max \$1M
- Joint applications are encouraged
- Expected to complete in 1-2 years
- 20% local match
- Can apply for implementation grant in future rounds once have an adopted Safety Action Plan (\$5M-\$30M awards)


#### **Grant Priorities**

# Successful Applications will have engagement and innovative strategies to:


- Promote safety
- Employ low-cost, high-impact strategies that can improve safety over a wider geographic area
- Ensure equitable investment in the safety needs of underserved communities
- Incorporate evidence-based projects and strategies
- Align with priorities such as equity, climate and sustainability, quality job creation, and economic strength and global competitiveness

#### What is a Safety Action Plan?

**Purpose:** to develop a holistic, well-defined strategy to prevent roadway fatalities and serious injuries in a locality, Tribe, or region.







- 1. Leadership Commitment and Goal Setting: Must include an official public commitment to an eventual goal of zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries with a timeline for achieving.
- EMCTC can adopt this commitment but does not have implementation authority - each participating jurisdiction would also be asked to adopt a vision zero goal as an outcome of this planning effort.
- **2. Planning Structure:** A committee charged with oversight of the Action Plan development, implementation, and monitoring.
- Proposing EMCTC in this role

- **3. Safety Analysis:** Develop a High Injury Network map based on crash and risk analysis for all roads in the jurisdictions.
- Consultants would conduct crash analysis using best practices and regional methodology.
- Health Department can provide expertise in applying a public health and equity lens to analysis.
- Can identify specific concerns we want to assess in more detail. e.g. safe crossings, areas with unsafe speeds, school routes, etc.

- **4. Engagement and Collaboration:** Robust engagement with public and stakeholders; feedback is incorporated into plan. Coordination among overlapping jurisdictions and other plans and processes.
- > Traditional engagement through city councils, committees, and neighborhood groups; public survey, tabling, etc.
- Culturally specific outreach to English language learners and other underserved populations in East County (provide compensation)
- Encourage participation in planning process by community organizations; build community capacity and compensate with stipends
- Agency collaboration will occur through EMCTC TAC and project meetings

- **5. Equity Considerations:** Inclusive processes; Analysis includes both population characteristics and initial equity impact assessments of the proposed projects and strategies.
- Engagement and Analysis tasks will incorporate equity considerations
- County Transportation is working on equity framework with Health Dept.
- Can develop a methodology for assessing projects based on best practices

- **6. Policy and Process Changes:** Assess plans and standards to improve how we prioritize transportation safety.
- > Consultant can help us review TSPs, CIPs, and design standards for opportunities
- **7. Strategy and Project Selections:** Prioritized list of projects and strategies with time ranges based on analysis, equity, and stakeholder input. The list should contain interventions focused on infrastructure, behavioral, and/or operational safety.
- Projects can include corridor improvements but also packages of low-cost solutions (e.g. crosswalks, ADA ramps, hot spot treatments)
- Strategies could include speed management planning, safe routes programming, etc.
- Can also include quick build pilot projects to inform our planning

- **8. Progress and Transparency:** Measure progress and outcomes after plan adopted and share with stakeholders on annual basis.
- ➤ EMCTC would be the main venue for this transparency and progress reporting. Bring information to each jurisdiction as well.
- County staff would lead reporting efforts with support from EMCTC TAC.
