CBAC Budget Feedback

- Third-party staffing adequacy study performed in 2018 and again in 2023, identified under staffing of 35.9% and 24.7%, respectively. As discussed in our letter, we believe the understaffing is more significant than stated in the report.
- MCDA dashboards confirm this: Open cases per prosecutor for felonies has grown from 38 to 101. Open cases per prosecutor for misdemeanors has grown from 525 to 766.
- Crime statistics imply that 1 in 10 residents are a victim of a crime.
- We appreciate that funding has increased, but is still short of what is needed, in our opinion.



CBAC Recommended Program Offers

- We support the MCDA's 2024 budget submission that addresses a historic crime wave.
- We support the recent funding of auto theft and organized retail theft task forces in partnership with the City of Portland enthusiastically Thank You!
- We do not support any budgetary reductions to the misdemeanor trial and property/drugs/human trafficking units. We support the restoration requests by MCDA.
- We support the Board's desire to see data driven results from the recently enacted pilot Multnomah Attorney Access Program (MAAP).
- We did not spend time on the body worn camera issue, and appreciate the caution in how this is funded.
- We thank the DA and his staff for their data-driven approach, full transparency and are encouraged by the DA's outreach with the communities most impacted by crime.



Budget by Fund - FY23 Adopted vs FY24 Proposed






6-Year Trend of Significant Funds





FTE - 6-Year Trend







Administration Division: Significant Program Changes

- Staff turnover has caused a larger workload for the Human Resources function and also requires
 management attention to strategies to attract and retain attorneys and administrative staff. Key executive
 team positions such as Finance Manager and Communications Director have turned over this fiscal year.
- The addition of an Equity Manager, funded for the first time in FY 2023, is helping MCDA identify where inclusive practices need to be developed.
- MCDA leadership developed a mission and values for the agency and are engaged in strategies to communicate this work throughout the organization.
- Information Technology Case Tracking System OTO (15002B/C) \$1.6M

 The implementation of a new case management system planned for FY 2024.
- Justice Integrity Unit (15021)
 The expungement workflow has moved from the Pretrial Unit (15204A) to this program.
- Information Technology (15002A)
 Reallocated 1.0 FTE Systems Administrator from Child Support Enforcement (15104)to this program.





Expungement Motions Received (by calendar year)







Division 1: Significant Program Changes

- In 2022, The Multnomah County Support Enforcement Division (SED) Treatment Court began, as the first
 child support treatment court created in Oregon. A collaboration between the Oregon Judicial Department,
 the Multnomah County District Attorney's Office, the Department of Community Justice and Multnomah
 Defenders Inc., the program uses a team approach to meet the needs of participants and focuses on
 stabilization, accountability, and lasting employment—with the goal of increased and continuous support for
 their children.
- Domestic Violence Case Management (15102B) \$195,805 1.00 FTE DDA 2
 Caseloads remain at a historically high level. Previously ARP-funded will be funded with one-time-only General fund
- Misdemeanor Trial Unit (15105) -\$174,898 -1.00 FTE DDA 1
 Position reduced as part of the General Fund constraint
- Child Support Enforcement (15104) -\$117,425 -1.00 FTE Support Enforcement Agent Federal grant-funding was reduced. This position is vacant and no longer performing programmatic grant work.





Actual Staff Count vs Reduced Staff Count



- Improve coordination with law enforcement, community victim services, the courts, and other systems involving underserved communities.


A VAWA case is where the victim/survivor is:

All Gun Violence Cases


"Gun violence" cases are defined as cases with at least one issued charge (with a firearm-tag) of Assault, Manslaughter, Attempted Murder, Murder, and/or Unlawful Use of a Weapon, and cases with adult defendant(s).

Felon in Possession of Firearm Cases

Felon in possession of firearm (FPFA) cases are defined as cases with at least one issued FPFA charge and **no** gun violence charges (Assault, Manslaughter, Attempted Murder, Murder, and/or Unlawful Use of a Weapon).

(Att) Murder w/Firearm Cases


"Attempted Murder w/Firearm" cases are defined as cases with at least one issued charge (with a firearm tab) of Attempted Murder and/or Murder, and cases with adult defendant(s). These cases are a subset of all gun violence cases.



- Gun Violence prosecutions increased 60% from 2019 to 2022
- FPFA prosecutions increased 21% from 2021 to 2022
- FPFA prosecutions increased 40% from 2019 to 2022
- Murder w/Firearm prosecutions increased 24% from 2021 to 2022
- Murder w/Firearm prosecutions increased 123% from 2019 to 2022

Division 3: Significant Program Changes

- Unit D continues to cope with a large number of homicide cases. There were more homicides in FY 2023 than the prior fiscal year, and these recent years represent a significant increase over historic patterns.
- Detaining defendants pre-trial now frequently requires an evidentiary hearing, adding to the workload necessary to ensure that people who are a danger to the community are held in jail.

- Organized Retail Theft Task Force (15301C) \$209,044 1.00 FTE DDA 2




Motor Vehicle Theft

Incidents and Cases Referred, 2019 - 2022





Incidents and Cases Referred, 2019 - 2022


Theft Offenses | 2019 - 2022


Felony Theft Issuance Rate and Follow-up Potential | 2018 - 2022

Division 4: Significant Program Changes

Both Victims Assistance Program (VAP) and Investigations are impacted by MCDA's
historically large caseload. Moreover, as the backlog increases, the amount of time
needed to resolve cases, VAP and Investigations must maintain relationships and the
whereabouts of key witnesses over a longer period of time. VAP has proposed
eliminating assistance to victims of some lower level cases in order preserve quality of
service to victims of more serious crimes.



Body Worn Cameras

- Current programs: Gresham PD, Port of Portland PD, & PSU.
- Multnomah County SO, PPB, and OHSU Public Safety all moving to BWC programs.
- Investment from FY23 paid dividends:
 - Two DA Investigators & one Legal Assistant reviewing close to 100% of felony cases issued.
 - Average length of video per case is 2 hours, 47 mins.
 - Additional staffing necessary to maintain current level of review.

Significant General Fund Reallocations

- Recent staff turnover has resulted in reduced staffing costs as senior staff are replaced by those with less seniority. MCDA is deploying these savings of \$373,413 in two areas:
 - Agency-wide: Reallocation of \$200,000 to Internal Services-Records due to a \$232,227 (or 62.2%) increase from the previous year. In FY 2023, MCDA received a one-time reduction, in the amount of \$100,000. In FY 2024, the charge is restored.
 - PO 15002 MCDA IT: Reallocation of \$173,413 to a continue mission-critical IT position, a Systems Administrator, which was previously funded by SED Incentive (Oregon Child Support Program.
- **PO 15402 Investigations Unit**: To align with County best practices, MCDA is budgeting the revenue and expenses of service contracts, previously from Other Funds, now to the General Fund. In this program offer, Portland Police Bureau contracts for the services of 3.00 MCDA Investigator positions.
