

Introduction

- Youth Opportunity and Workforce Development program provides youth ages 14 to 24 with incentivized learning opportunities and paid work experiences
- The program is administered by Worksystems Inc (WSI), the Local Workforce Development Board
- Services are delivered by a network of community and school partners
- Since 2014, the program has served about 8,000 participants and provided over \$8.0M in youth wages



Approach & Equity

- Youth experiencing barriers to employment are prioritized for placement
- Deep partnership with communities of color and advocacy organizations to develop programming and support services
- Proactively develop opportunities that are community-based and deliver services directly to underserved and marginalized communities
- Continually improve processes and center youth voice

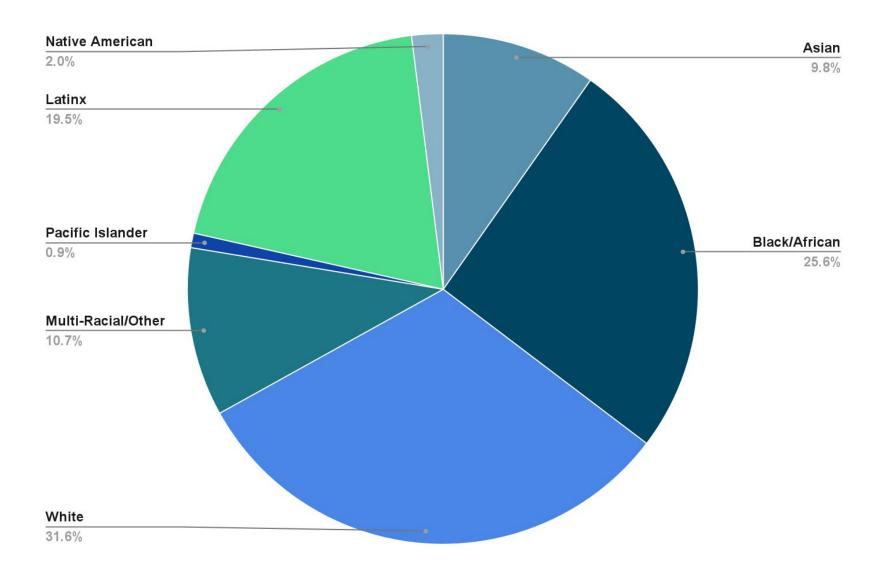

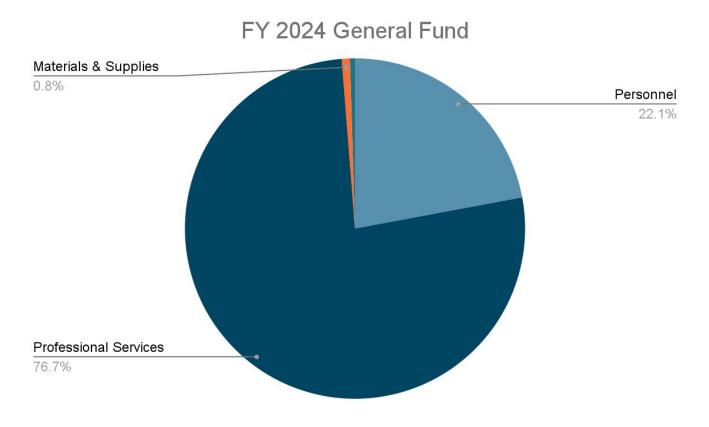


Youth Systems Building Academy

- In partnership with Worksystems Inc, POIC and Multnomah County's Juvenile Services Division.
- Focused on creating pathways for justice-involved youth to improve employment outcomes

PHASE 1: March 2022 - June 2023

 Planning, outreach and implementation with community partners to develop curriculum, identify eligible youth, and onboard work site supervisors.

PHASE 2: July 2022 – July 2023

 Support two community-based organizations with expertise in positive youth development to pilot core program functions, and serve a cohort of 80 youth in a variety of professional and educational settings including incentive-based interventions and year-round work experience.

PHASE 3: July 2023 – July 2024

 Expand community-based organizations to a total of five program providers and serve an additional 200 youth, while ushering the previous cohort into the larger youth workforce system
