To Whom It May Concern:

When my wife, Leslie and I purchased our home on Carpenter lane nearly thirty years ago, we did so for a number of reasons. At the time, we lived in the City of Portland where I worked as a police officer. I wanted my family to live somewhere much safer than the city, as the writing was on the wall even then, that the city was declining and policies in place were only speeding that decline along.

We found that safer place at 34546 SE Carpenter Lane in 1993. I moved my wife and two young children into an 1896 farmhouse on a small acreage there. The neighbors were friendly and watched out for each other. Most importantly, the narrow farm road had minimal traffic, which moved at a safe pace and the area was safe for kids & critters, tractors, and farm workers. In addition, everyone knew everyone who belonged there; the odd individual up to mischief was usually easy to spot and get moving along.

The nature of the area is farming and small scale rural homesteads. Zoning kept it so and we all liked it that way. There are no body shops, mechanics businesses, or other industrial activities, because the zoning and land use laws prohibit private individuals from changing the nature of the neighborhood with noncompliant practices.

Now the City of Portland (my former employer) proposes to invade our rural setting with a huge industrial plant that was rejected from one of the City's own neighborhoods by angry residents. This large proposed industrial facility is intended to be plopped down at the end of our quiet little country lane, where it will sit, like a wart, in the middle of a bucolic viewshed. The necessary security lighting to accommodate such a facility will pollute our night sky. The required shipping in of materials and chemicals, which is a huge safety concern, will necessitate dozens of trips a day by large heavy trucks.

And this is only AFTER the plant is constructed.

I have no small amount of experience with this. After I retired from the Portland Police Bureau, I worked for a number of years for the City of West Linn. As in this case, an outside municipality owned a small water facility in a quiet, pleasant residential area near the Willamette River and had for years. Again, the outside municipality elected to undertake a massive construction project for their water system in the heart of this quiet neighborhood. Neighbors objected and were told their worries were not realistic, and the powers that be allowed this plan to proceed.

The project required extensive excavation, resulting in large cranes, and excavators being moved in and placed. The calls to the police department and city hall were constant. People's homes were being shaken by this equipment moving about. Noise was intrusive. The degradation of the streets was immediate. Once the equipment was in place, the hauling out of the displaced dirt was continuous.

Night and day. The disruption and discord continued. Complaints were so constant by the residents, that the City finally instructed us to just tell our residents "Sorry, you just have to deal with it."

That plant was a pumping station and much smaller than the proposed water filtration plant being proposed on Carpenter Lane. The West Linn project disrupted hundreds of peoples lives for the better part of a year. We are told the Carpenter Lane plant construction will take MULTIPLE YEARS! Mulitiple years of hundreds of truck trips a day, as well as the invasion of construction workers required to facilitate the placement of the plant.

In addition to the danger inherent in such a large volume of heavy vehicular traffic (as well as the road degradation), there is the added concern of criminal activity. It's no secret that there is a significant amount of meth usage in the construction trades. A number of drug arrests I made while working as a police officer were of individuals working in the trades. Any large influx of construction personnel is likely to include some of these folks, and with them the crimes committed by drug users.

In short, I see no reason to permit this proposed plant to proceed. As mentioned previously, state land use laws prohibit private citizens from disrupting a neighborhood with noncompliant activities and government should be required, when reasonable, to be a "good citizen" as well.

If indeed Portland Water Bureau must build this hugely complex and expensive filtration plant (as opposed to a simpler, much less expensive UV treatment facility that will accomplish the same mission), Carpenter Lane is NOT the appropriate location.

The logical placement of this edifice is near the source of the Bureau's water or at a terminus in an industrial region of the city being served. This would avoid the disruption of east county citizens lives and have the bonus of eliminating the hugely expensive porton of the construction process to connect the existing City's water pipeline to a filtration plant a mile away.

Our two granddaughters used to walk to our house with their little suitcases rolling along beside them. My husband and I enjoy the quiet evenings when we can look at the night sky and not see it cluttered with lights. We also have a grade school, middle school and a high school all within walking distance of our home. A huge water treatment plant is inappropriate for the Carpenter Lane location.

Dear Clackamas County Board of Commissioners,

Picture your elementary school. An American flag flying out front, a playground – the sound of children's voices as they play tag – a teacher welcoming you in for the day, a bell ringing as you sit down at your desk. Pencils across paper, keys on a keyboard, the teacher's voice.

These sounds and sights are what you would see and hear if you visited Oregon Trail Academy, an International Baccalaureate World School, where students from kindergarten through eighth grade are taught to be world citizens and take care of themselves, each other, and the environment around them.

However, all of this is at stake with the possibility of Portland Water Bureau using an access road that is mere FEET away from our school's front door and recess yard.

If Portland Water Bureau is granted an easement to use the adjacent dirt road to haul in cement and chemicals while hauling out fill dirt and waste, the sound pollution alone would cause many students to go into sensory overload, making it impossible for them to focus on learning how to read. A lead engineer for PWB was noted to say that the "noise and vibration from the pile driving during construction would make it very difficult to live around it". How would we be able to conduct normal school activities if the lead engineer noted that the impacts would be so great that no one would even want to live here? The close proximity of the road is a grave concern.

Once the construction is over, that doesn't mean the sound pollution would end – our school would constantly be bombarded by heavy trucking sounds as PWB uses and maintains the facility. The additional heavy truck traffic would converge at the vertex of a complex intersection where Bluff, Proctor, and 362nd all meet.

I was working one afternoon and heard a horrific sound of metal scraping, screeching, and thuds rolling. I was one of the first people on the scene of a terrible accident only yards away from our school where a car took the triple intersection corner too fast and rolled multiple times. We do not need to add another entry point to the already-confusing intersection, where up to 200 heavy semi trips would be made every day. One wrong move, one glare of the sun, and a carload of students could die. This project is not worth that risk. It is a risk that will not go away once the construction is finished. It would hinder Oregon Trail Academy forever.

Thank you, Board of Commissioners, for your time and consideration. Please use your power to stop the PWB project and protect the lives and learning of our students at Oregon Trail Academy.

I love the night sky in my rural area, it's very dark with a lot of visible stars on clear nights. There is very little to none when it comes to light pollution in my area. There are coyotes, owls, hawks, and doves that frequent my property. I have seen a couple of

herons flying by just this month around dinner time (June 2023). About once a year in the mornings deer are often seen crossing the road I live on as they travel to their next feeding area.

As far as safety, living far out from the city has its advantages as not many criminals or unwanted strangers are interested in our farm/agricultural community. I love the fact that the fire station is only 1-2 miles away and feel safe knowing that they can respond in a timely manner should we ever need it.

On our small farm we have chickens ranging in age from 6 months to 4 years. We cultivate blackberries on our property as they are such a sweet treat. We have a garden and container boxes where we love to grow and eat fresh foods. The year-round stream that runs through our property contains frogs that sing every evening in late spring through summer adding a wonderful sound of county to our lives.

I commute to Sandy Oregon during the work week (8am and 430pm) and rarely see farm equipment on the roads and never see commercial truck traffic until I reach Hwy 26. If the water filtration plant comes in, the character of the area will change, and many more outsiders will be coming into our small rural farm community increasing the chance of crime.

Commuting times will change drastically for me with all the commercial truck traffic that will be in my area with the construction of the water filtration plant. I will also be exposed to hazardous situations with these trucks and their potential for accidents and chemical spillage. Massive amounts of hazardous chemicals will be used in daily plant operations. PWB expects 1,300 trucks per year to transport tons of chemicals and waste on our roads, even in dangerous weather conditions. This presents a constant, critical risk to our community and already limited emergency resources.

Pleasant Home Road has its quirks, as there are many potholes and narrow places to walk next to the road. The speed limit is 45 but traffic often travels 60+ which makes walking unenjoyable for me. Any further future commercial truck traffic on this road would be unbearable.
