Now this isn't just a small industrial building – it is currently a proposed 45 acre facility with plans to expand in the future.— Let's put that in perspective: 45 acres is 1,960,200 sq ft. – Clackamas Town Center's total retail space is 1.5 Million. How can anyone say this won't change the character of our community?!

Why is this happening? Oh yes, PWB explained the cryptosporidium issue so originally I thought we would just have to accept this disruption to our country life. But then I heard there was a EPA apprved option; (UV) and UV+Ozone which meant no additional chemicals to the water and minimal disruption to the community at a much less cost.
