## Goal of the Community Corrections Plan

Accomplish performance outcome measures identified in the Intergovernmental Agreement with the State of Oregon while articulating local priorities and needs.

- **Supervision:** Adult felony and some misdemeanors.
- Services: Internal and community-based programming and treatment.
- Sanctions / Jail: Housing and programming for individuals sentenced to custody for twelve months or less.

6,590 unique individuals served51% High / Very High risk

56% Probation44% Post-Prison

80% Felony20% Misdemeanor



#### Legislative Changes

2003 - Evidence-based practices

- 2005 Specialty Court model
- 2013 Justice reinvestment + earned discharge
- 2021 Eliminated supervision fees
- 2022 Trauma-informed care, culturally specific services, and de-escalation techniques
- 2023 Expanded earned discharge

#### **Innovation and best practices**

**H.E.A.T.** - Habilitation, Empowerment, Accountability, and Therapy

- Embedded in African American Program
- 126 dosage hours
- More meaningful contacts
- Stipends to participants

Cohort 1 includes 6 different rival gangs. The sessions are neutral ground. HEAT encourages us to model living in harmony with people we may choose not to associate with. **S.A.R.P.** - Stabilization and Readiness Program

- Embedded in Mental Health Unit
- Rest: Clients have a safe space to rest, eat, and hang out
- Progress: Trust building leads to better outcomes
- Reconnect: DCj and Community Partners are able to have reliable meaningful contact

79% of participants engaged in skills / case management on their first visit.



#### **Sanctions**

Community-based alternatives to jail


- Community service
- Electronic monitoring

Jail sanctions

- Prioritized for identifiable victim safety issues
- Monitor usage and relative rate index through the use of dashboards
- Approximately 120-140 individuals at any given time
