### 2023 Year in Review

# **INVESTMENTS INTO EAST COUNTY**

- Regional Flexible Funding Allocation (RFFA) Gresham received \$7.5 million for 162nd Avenue; Multnomah County received \$6.5 million for Sandy Blvd.
- Oregon Community Pathways Grant Program (OCP) The Port of Portland received \$1.2 million to complete new segments of the 40 Mile Loop in Gresham and Troutdale; the Troutdale 2nd Street Bridge received \$215,000; Gresham received \$700,000 for the North Gresham Park Path, and \$860,000 for the Columbia View Park Path.
- Metro's Regional Travel Options Funding (RTO) Gresham received
  \$10,000 to design and install a permanent traffic playground at Davis Park
- Trail Bond Grant Gresham received \$4.2 million for the Gresham to Fairview trail, from NE Halsey to NE Sandy Blvd; Troutdale received \$1.9 million for the Sandy River Greenway
- USDOT National Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage Program -Multnomah County received \$1.4 million for the Beaver Creek Fish Passage Restoration at Troutdale Road project
- Safe Streets for All The region received a planning grant with \$445,000 for developing a East Multnomah County Transportation Safety Action Plan
- Safe Routes to School Multnomah County received \$2M Infrastructure Grant funding for NE 223rd
- Congressional Delegated Spending Gresham received \$3 million for the 181st Safety Project; ODOT received \$2.5 million for the I-84 Multi-Use Path Jordan Road Tunnel to Sandy River Delta project; Multnomah County received \$2 million for Earthquake Ready Burnside Bridge.

# **MULTIJURISDICTIONAL PROJECTS & PROGRAMS**

#### MAIN STREETS ON HALSEY

- Drafted new cross-section and 10%
  Design Plan for NE 201st to NE 257th
- Conducted three major community engagement campaigns
- Work done as partnership between Fairview, Troutdale, Wood Village and Multnomah County

#### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

- Conducted community events like Walk and Roll to School and Pedestrian Safety Lessons
- Successful collaboration between Multnomah County, PBOT and Gresham, as well as school district collaboration with Reynolds, Centennial, and Gresham Barlow
- OTC approved the NE 223rd SRTS Construction Project

# **EMCTC & Partners Major Milestones**

EMCTC is proud to collaborate with regional agencies that function outside of East County to ensure all our community members have access to critical services, infrastructure, and information. There was a lot of great work done this year to make meaningful improvements to our region. Here is a look inside 2023.



# FAIRVIEW OREGON

- Began work on their Transit and Bike Hub Concept Plan
- Added two projects to the Regional Transportation Plan:
  - Fairview Parkway Multi Use Path
  - Transit & Bike Hub Concept Plan



 Completed their NE Halsey Rapid Rectangular Flashing Beacon (RRFB) project, which included the installation of three pedestrian crossings between Wood Village Blvd and 244th Ave.



- Received EMCTC endorsement for a refinement evaluation of the 2nd Street Bridge Project
- Collaborated with partners on critical Main Streets on Halsey work



- Received Safe Streets for All grant funding - \$20 million implementation grant for safety improvements on the 122nd Ave Corridor
- Received RFFA funding for 148th Ave Safety & Access to Transit Project
- Coordinated with EMCTC and regional partners on RTP priority projects that will help advance East County goals



- 7 grants were awarded for work to be completed in Gresham!
- Held transportation safety events like the Bike Rodeo and Safety Fest in collaboration with Safe Routes to School
- Completed multimodal project along Hogan Road from Burnside to Powell as well as the Gresham Greenway bike route
- Repaved 25% of their local streets and upgraded or installed 1,128 ADA ramps through the Hitting the Streets program



- Completed some major construction projects & updates:
- Paving on NE Glisan & ADA Ramp improvements in partnership with Gresham
- Larch Mountain Project, mileposts 7-14
- Latourell Falls Bridge Replacement project completed construction
- Completed critical design & planning work:
- 257th Project 60% design
- ADA Ramp Project moving forward to 100% design for tier one projects!
- Sandy 201st to 230th Planning project out for request for proposals
- Graham Road Bridge Strengthening project awarded, construction in 2024
- Troutdale Culvert received design grant
- Developed a new online permit portal for Land Use, Transportation and Service Districts



#### **Health Department**

- Released the Public Health Data Report: Traffic Crash Deaths in Multnomah County, which details traffic fatalities, contributing factors, and safe system based recommendations for addressing growing trends
- Multnomah County Health Department also released a pedestrian injuries report which analyzes serious traffic injuries and fatalities for pedestrians throughout the county
- Collaborated with REACH program to plan and develop a walk audit methodology to identify community priorities for crime prevention and safety



- Completed improvements on I-84 including paving, bridge improvements, & ADA ramps at NE 122nd Ave and repaving asphalt at the junction of I-205 Marine Drive
- Had another successful year of timed use permits at Multnomah Falls
- Ran the Oregon Community Pathways Grant program and allocated funding to East County



- Construction is underway for the Better Red Project
- 2023 saw a lot of service growth and restoration!
- May: Line 17 upgrade to frequent service
- August: Line 54 upgraded to frequent service
- December: Line 48 upgraded to frequent service
- New City Hall Library broke ground this summer in Gresham, replacing a former Park and Ride
- Division FX marked its one year anniversary, showing an increase of half a million rides in the first year

# Port of Portland

- They were awarded an ODOT Community Pathways Grant for the 40 Mile Loop
  - About \$1.2 million to be used to complete an important segment of the loop in Troutdale and Fairview!
  - This project will provide safe, separated paths for people walking & bike, and will total over 140 miles of connected trails when complete



- Adopted an update for the Regional Transportation Plan
- Received two major federal grants: an EPA Climate Pollution and Reduction Grant, and an FHWA Safe Streets for All Grant - creating opportunities for communities to receive needed safety & climate funding

A major 2023 regional milestone was an update to the Regional Transportation Plan. EMCTC endorsed Easy County's priority projects, & the region adopted the full plan update in December.

This includes \$3 billion of investments planned in East Multnomah County, including:

- High Capacity Transit serving Burnside/Stark & Parkrose
- Safety projects along key arterials like SW 257th Drive, and NE Halsey Street.
