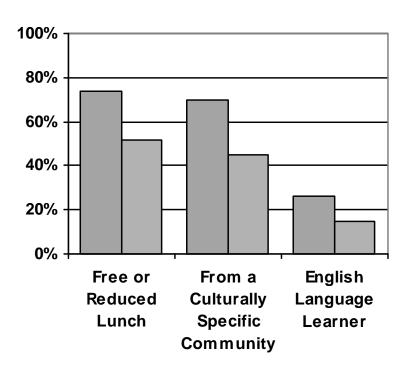

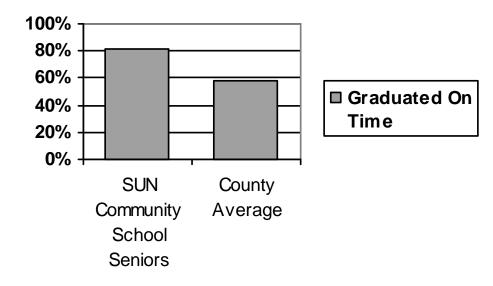

SUN Service System serves its intended population



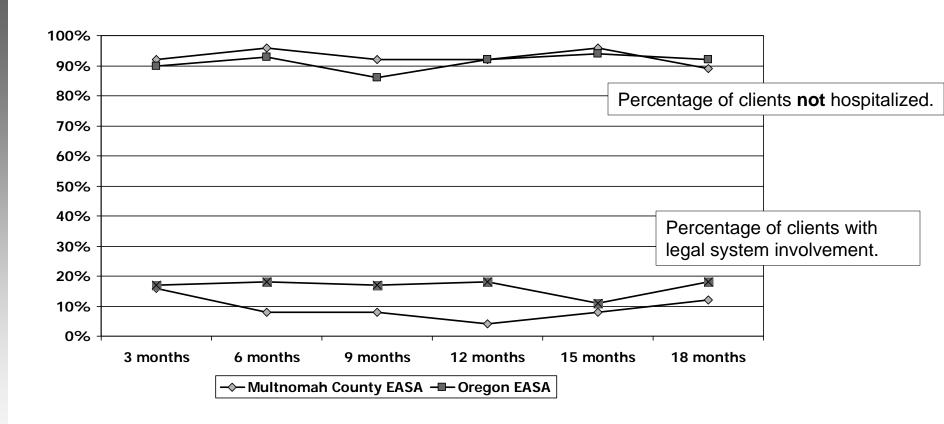
SUN Community School Seniors Are Graduating at a Higher Rate than the County average.



■ SUN Community Schools

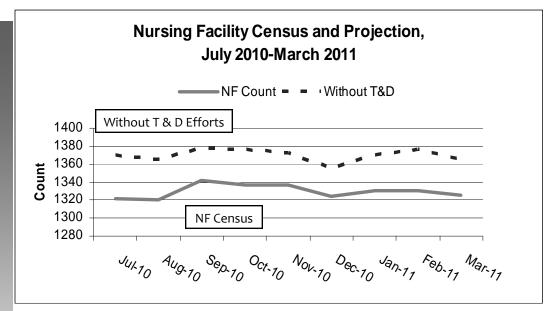
■ Av erage all Multnomah County Schools

Measuring Success: Early Assessment Support Alliance

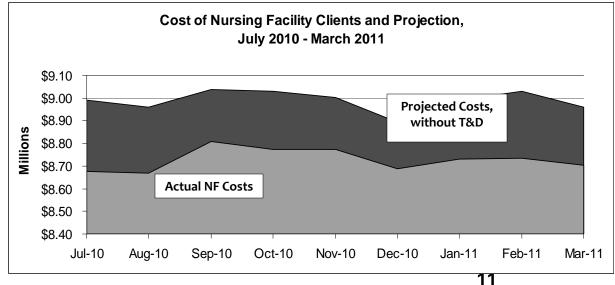


EASA is an early psychosis intervention program to address the needs of persons aged 15-25 who are demonstrating the first symptoms of psychosis.

Measuring Success: ADS Transition and Diversion Efforts



T&D efforts have saved \$2.3 million since July 2010.



FY2011 Accomplishments

- ADS Adult Protective Services substantiated financial exploitation of 238 vulnerable adults.
- In the last 9 months 77 individuals were served by Homeless Benefits Recovery 74% secured federal entitlement funds SSI, SSDI, Medicaid and Medicare.
- The mental health forensic diversion program served 103 clients in FY10, helping 63 find housing in the community, enrolling 15 in OHP and obtaining SSI/SSDI for 22 clients.
- The Crisis Assessment and Treatment Center (CATC) will open June 21, 2011.

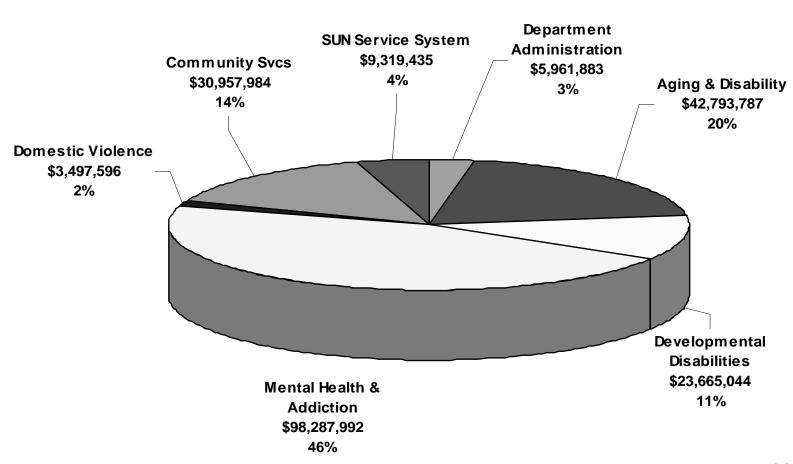
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FY2011 Accomplishments

- The SUN Hunger Relief Project supported extended summer meal sites through the summer and established 6 emergency food pantries.
- Defending Childhood Initiative
- Regional Domestic Violence Summit
- Developmental Disabilities Services Division Monitoring Unit stabilized 2 large provider agencies and kept 40 people within the homes.

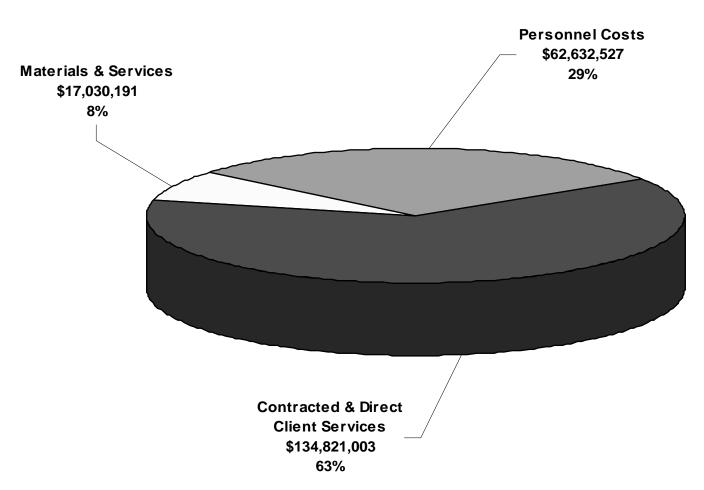
DEPARTMENT OF COUNTY HUMAN SERVICES FY 11/12 Executive Budget

Total Budget \$214,483,721

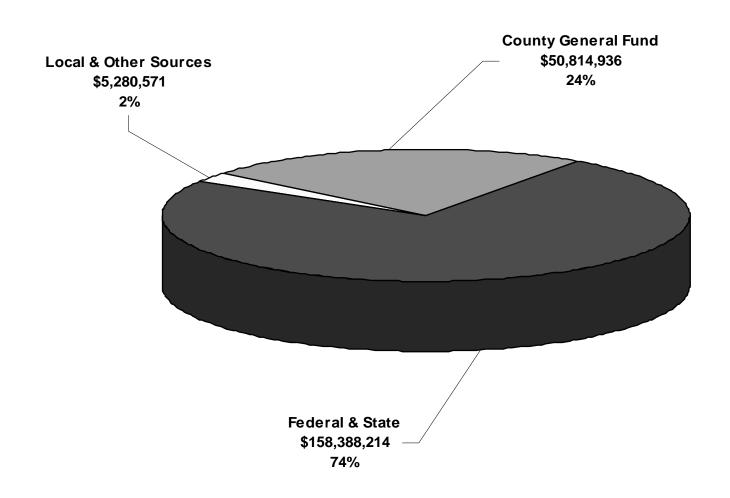


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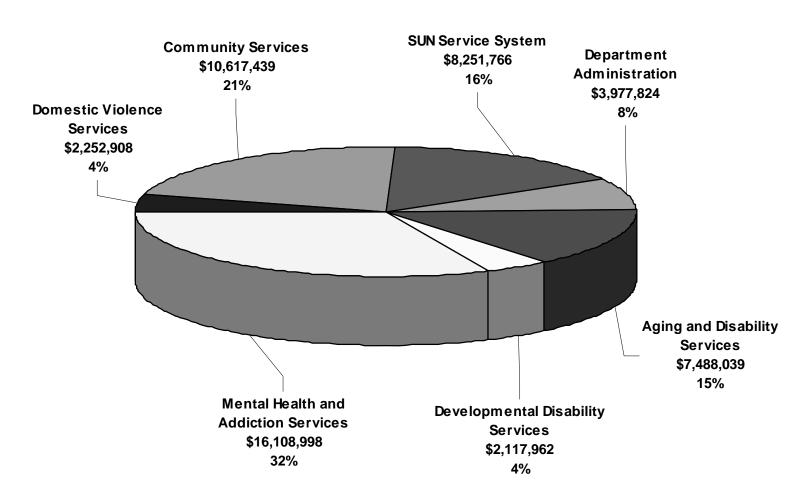


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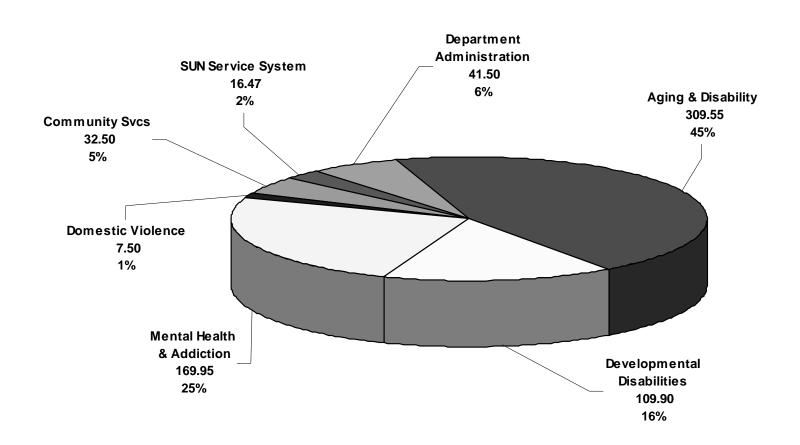

State Impacts

Aging and Disability Services

- Medicaid Long Term Care funding for staffing is expected to grow due to caseload increases
- Similar funding investments are expected in Adult Protective Services
- Oregon Project Independence is expected to be cut by 50%

Developmental Disabilities

10% cut in targeted case management

State Impacts

Mental Health and Addiction Services Division

- 19% reduction in OHP/Verity funded mental health services
- Up to 20% reduction in State General Funded mental health services
- Up to 20% reduction in State General Funded addiction services

Community Services

- Commission on Children, Families & Community- 100% reduction of this source for runaway youth services
- Reduction in Emergency Housing Account (EHA) for homeless families
- Reduction in State Homeless Assistance Program (SHAP) for homeless families and domestic violence shelters

Federal Impacts

Domestic Violence- the end of ARRA will result in:

- Approximately \$650,000 in cuts to community-based providers for victim services
- The end of transitional housing assistance for 20 families per year

Community Services

- Community Development Block Grant up to a 16% reduction in public works in East County cities
- Community Services Block Grant up to a 50% reduction in antipoverty and homeless families services
- Low Income Energy Assistance up to a 50% reduction in energy bill payment assistance

Issues

- Oregon Health Transformation/Health Care Reform
- Potential reductions to TANF
- State funding formula for staffing under DHS/SPD
- No provision of COLA to community-based providers
- The possible elimination of day programs for developmentally disabled adults

Challenges

- Mitigating the impact of state cuts on the county's most vulnerable citizens
- Governor's Early Childhood Redesign
- New abbreviated state rule timelines put greater workload on under-funded Developmental Disability eligibility unit
- Meeting the goal of 'Every School a SUN Community School'
- DCHS succession planning
- Under-resourced in evaluation & fiscal analysis
