Service Area & Target Groups/Focus

Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure – primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

School Population: 463 students; Grades K-8; 100% Eligible for Free Meals;
76% Students of Color (African American 12%, American Indian/AK Native 1%, Asian 4%, Hispanic 54%, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander 2%, Multiple Race 4%, White 24%)

Evaluation

Outputs

217 youth served

84% students of color
65% identified as being “at risk of academic failure”
91% qualified for free and reduced lunch

54 adults served

269 served in non-enrollment events
(family educational nights, cultural fairs, etc.)

Outcomes

69% of students increased benchmark scores in Reading *
74% of students increased benchmark scores in Math *
Average daily attendance of SUN CS students was **91%**

SUN Spotlight

Last year at Scott School SUN we completed three projects that fostered and enriched our relationships with Scott parents and students. They were Painting our Playground, Painting the Scott Mural and Scott’s Garden.

Each project was a SUN class in which parents were highly involved and the tasks that they took on varied from, writing grants, talking to local business to receive donations, recruiting other Scott families, providing tools and materials.
