Service Area & Target Groups/Focus

Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

School Population: 527 students; Grades 6-8; 24% Free and Reduced Lunch; 25% Students of Color (African American 2%, American Indian/AK Native < 1%, Asian 4%, Hispanic 8%, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander <1%, Multiple Race 10%, White 75%)

SUN Spotlight

Since the opening of Home Forward's redeveloped Stephens Creek Crossing (SCC) in January 2014, SUN School has worked in collaboration with the SCC staff to help transition the youth and families into Robert Gray Middle School and the Hillsdale community. A new position at Neighborhood House, funded by Home Forward, is the Youth Outreach Specialist. This staff person has a strong partnership with SUN School and that helps connect the SCC youth to the schools in our neighborhood. The Youth Outreach Specialist collaborated with SUN School to host a break dancing competition at Robert Gray Middle School called Break Unity. The Break Unity event brought Stephens Creek Crossing, Robert Gray, and the dance community together for a positive experience break dancing. The SUN School and SCC break dancers did a performance, and professional breakers from Portland and Seattle shared their talents in a competition. The Break Unity event was a great way to highlight the talents of staff, youth, and our community. We hope to bring more events like this to Robert Gray Middle School!
