Jackson Middle School

Lead Agency: Impact Northwest

Service Area & Target Groups/Focus

Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure – primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

School Population: 607 students; Grades 6-8; 27% Free and Reduced Lunch; 27% Students of Color (African American 8%, American Indian/AK Native <1%, Asian 3%, Hispanic 7%, Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander <1%, Multiple Race 6%, White 73%)

Evaluation

<u>Outputs</u>

207 youth served

44% students of color

66% identified as being "at risk of academic failure"38% qualified for free and reduced lunch

61 adults served

720 people served in non-enrollment events (family educational nights, cultural fairs, etc.)

Outcomes

68% of students increased benchmark scores in Reading *
71% of students increased benchmark scores in Math *
Average daily attendance of SUN CS students was 90%

SUN Spotlight

Student "JK" had trouble staying organized, remembering what homework to bring home and what was due the next day. JK objected to attending after-school programming, but eventually decided to give Jackson Middle School's SUN Homework Club a try. After a few weeks into the school year, when asked about his regular attendance at Homework Club, JK admitted that his grades were improving, he understood the classroom content better, and enjoyed making new friends who provided positive peer pressure associated with school work.

"Preparing for Homework Club immediately after school helped me remember what needed to go into my backpack at the end of the day, what was due soon, what to bring home with me," said JK. When JK's Mom was asked about what she noticed, she said "What JK needed was an atmosphere to do an hour of homework each day after school – so that being organized was the first thought, not getting home to other distractions."

We see this more and more as the school year progresses. Students are developing more confidence and enjoying the management of school work because of Jackson's SUN Homework Club.
