SUN Spot: SUN in Action

This year Franklin was a pilot site for All Hands Raised's "Rapid Cycle" approach to increasing FAFSA completion among high school seniors. A small team was formed, including counselors, teachers and support service providers. The team met several times, each time setting one clear, attainable goal to track and measure success after implementing. From increasing attendance at a FAFSA Night from 70 the previous year to 173, there were many positive results. By mid-May, Franklin's completion rate was at 83%, providing a model for other PPS High Schools. Two members from the team presented the strategies and results at district level meetings and even in Washington D.C. when Michelle Obama's Education Cabinet wanted to learn more about our work. SUN Site Manager was also invited to present on this in an equity workshop at University of Portland.
