


## PUBLIC SAFETY BRIEF: MAY 2005 (BETA TEST VERSION)





**Notes:** Average Daily Reported Offenses declined slightly; Portland had decreases while Gresham increased (specifically in auto theft). Average Daily Arrests decreased slightly due to fewer *Other* category arrests. Average Daily Bookings decreased, mainly due to decreases in felony-level Drug offenses. The MCSO reported 414 matrix releases (average 13.4 per day), a substantial decline over April's levels. Average length of stay increased over April by more than one day (+8%).

Of those, 575 cases were pending review may differ from the orginal primary charge. May had 1,605 convictions; 26% were felonies; 162 cases were unsentenced.



**Notes**. The DA Adult Cases Received increased slightly—due to increases in *Alcohol & Drugs, Behavioral* and *Person* offenses. Adult Supervision caseloads decreased overall (increase in *RST* was offset by declines in both *Specialized* and *Non-Specialized cases*). The *African-American Program (AAP)* is a new *Specialized* adult caseload type now reported herein. Juvenile caseload was down slightly due to fewer medium- and low-risk supervision cases (caseload per counselor remained unchanged overall).
