When active, the resources are fully available and easy to access. When on inactive duty, those become much harder to reach.

When trying to reintegrate, things change greatly.

Yellow Ribbon Events – Very helpful, paid for full families, had childcare. Spouse that is home is used to doing everything.

Systems vary depending on the unit they are in. Some are very family inclusive and others are not.

Families readiness group – organized groups of families for those with family members deployed. These groups vary greatly, and are very dependent on the organizational skills of those that lead them. Big ticket items have the least family influence – homelessness. Supportive housing grant (failed webinar) is going out soon – Seth has talked to Human Solutions about applying

Greg: Before family deploys, there needs to be the information available. There is a model for dealing with deployment. Veterans center at Clackamas CC.

Lee: Is there a way to look at what is already going on in the county that could centralize all the resources.

We need to get the resources out to those who seek it before they are deployed.
