2010 Juvenile Crime Trends / Recidivism Liang Wu Multco Department of Community Justice Research & Evaluation Specialist	Liang shared an overview of the 2010 Juvenile Crime Trends the number of criminal referrals received by Multnomah County Juvenile Service Division decreased by 17.8%, from 3,384 in 2009 to 2,781 in 2010. Referrals dropped substantially for many crimes, including property crimes such s theft and burglary. The number of youth offenders also decreased between 2009 and 2010. The unique count of Multnomah County youth who had at least one criminal referral in 2010 was the lowest since 2000. The 12-month recidivism rate for the Year 2009 offenders was 31.1%. It was virtually same as the rate of the previous year. It was noted that we need to define "criminal referral rate" vs. "recidivism" OJJDA will be working to define this. There was a suggestion to look at both adjudicated vs. prosecuted. Multco Public Safety Coordinating Council Staff Assistant	to events of gang violence in Multnomah County. This Analyst Collaborative created an analysis product that combined agency information, developed methods for displaying this information graphically, and developed materials to assist consumers of the analysis with interpretation of the final analysis product, or "network map." The resulting product was found to be relevant and informative of the work of law enforcement and criminal justice staff for the purposes of 1?understanding the risk characteristics of persons associated with the subject of the network map and 2? Identifying which agency may be the most effective actor for prevention, intervention and suppression activities. Resulting from this demonstration project of collaborative network analysis, additional analyses have been requested from the Analyst Collaborative. As these projects request have emerged, it has become abundantly clear to the Analyst Collaborative and the leadership of Multnomah's Youth and Gang Violence Steering Committee that a formal agreement, policies and procedures should be put in place to preserve and enhance this collaboration. The goal is to create a coordinated and collaborative analysis process contributing to the prevention and de-escalation of events of youth and gang violence that is sustainable and informed by shared data and analysis. They are asking folks to commit to 1 year and it was suggested they join with the Rapid Response group. There was concern this helpful tool would be misused resulting in racial profiling who will monitor for misuse?
