Mayor Adam Ordinance Proposals David Koch Juvenile Service Division Deputy Director	David talked about highlights from this proposal that affects the City of Portland area only. The proposal will go into effect quickly affecting all juveniles who are adjudicated for gun-related offenses (approximately 30 youth) - these are misdemeanor crimes. The question is how will Juvenile Service Division respond to curfew offenses? How can we engage families in this process?</p> <p>Steve Doell mentioned that a community member referenced the juvenile report written by the Crime Victims United - he suggested reviewing three sections of the report:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Police Department • Juvenile Service Division staff (Sections 3 & 4) • Recommendations (Section 7) <p>The community questioned why there is nothing in place to ensure the community is safe in regards to juveniles carrying guns? There are county programs currently in place to address these issues but they are not getting the job done - the community observes youth with gun charges being released into their communities. They state programs need to be preventive and not "after the fact" reactionary.</p> <p>Some of these troubled youth are identified early in the system - what type of supports are put in place for these vulnerable families prior to a youth offending? Suggested to reinvent relationships between communities, cultures, races, etc. - establish a cultural community center to begin bringing these groups together. To be effective, we need to partner with:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • School systems (education) • Communities of faith • Actual parents, relatives, families who truly support the youth • Parent advisory committee <p>The community also questioned if LPSCC included or considered the community while writing this proposal?
