See Attachments to Cover Email	Of 2636 unduplicated youth with a criminal referral in 2008, 818 (31.0%) had a subsequent criminal referral during the following 12 months The recidivism rate for the 2008 offender cohort was the lowest since 2000. The total number of recidivating youth was the lowest as well	
	6.1% of the 2636 youth were chronic offenders responsible for 43.2% of the new criminal referrals incurred within 12 months. It was interesting to note that rate for referrals for white youth were falling faster than any other - what are we doing differently for them?	
	These were the lowest criminal referrals in 10 years - we have an opportunity to possibly make some in-roads with cross-over youth according to this data. The council will be interested to see how the strategic plan will affect DMC. The next report will be an evaluation of the Assessment Unit.

Need for Joint Case Staffing for Cross-Over Youth Abbey Stamp Court Improvement Coordinator	The team that implemented the Crossover Youth Practice Model (CYPM) continues to meet twice monthly. One of the meetings is with Jerry Burns (DHS), Dave Koch and Judge Waller. Here, the team staffs challenging cases. The staffing both moves the case along and helps identify system obstacles for crossover youth. For example, DHS, DCJ, OYA and the Court are discussing placement barriers for crossover youth. Our agencies pay different amounts for the same service, some child welfare placements will not tolerate acting-out behavior, etc. For questions about staffing or getting involved in CYPM implementation and barrier busting, call Abbey.
