## **Welcome and Introductions**

Jennifer presented on the role of JTAP specialists and issues or barriers faced by veterans that they are working with. Jennifer provided example from immediately prior to the meeting in which she is assisting a single mom who is underemployed. Provides immediate resources to help service member stabilize and helps with resume (especially translating skills to civilian employment roles) to help her find another job. JTAP has a great partnership with Hero 2 Hire that has resulted in 1200 new hires since last October.  Very important for JTAP to know what resources are available and how to pick them up, especially around the base. 75% of her caseload of airmen live in Multnomah County.  Top needs she has seen are around education, specifically educating schools how to work with a family when a child is often tardy, what to do and the impact when a parent deploys, and how to get information on resources for military families. There isn't much data on military-connected children, so the group determined this would be good next step. Many teachers and school staff don't know if a child is from a military family.  Group discussed developing a proposal for schools to 1) identify military-connected students on registration or other form, 2) build awareness among school staff about issues, needs, and resources for this population, and 3) identify best practices for collaborations between schools and the community partners engaged in the VTF. 	Presented update on recent and upcoming deployments. Of the anticipated 1,000 or more deployments in the next year, approximately half are married, and those who are married have an average of 1.4 kids so there are likely hundreds of kids in Oregon schools this year with a parent deployed.  Additional needs facing National Guard families include:  Finding providers who will take Tri-Care  Getting financial needs met – both emergency assistance and ongoing financial planning to pay expenses  Handyman services such as mowing the lawn, car repair, etc  Coordinating the work of natural family supports (employers, churches, family/friends, and others) that families rely on	
USO Portland Update Steven Easterday	Port of Portland opened the 161 <sup>st</sup> USO at the airport this past week. Opening party was attended by Sen. Wyden, Sen. Merkley's office, USO board members, and many others. It's on the second floor near the clock tower in main concourse at airport. Helping Men Heal Matt Burton	Matt presented an overview of this project, which is focused on male trauma and loss. Research suggests that 61% of men experience trauma and 30% of adult males were abused as children. The project is focusing on the military because service members are trained to "suck it up and deal with it". The curriculum teaches about trauma, introduces evidence-based tools, and models application of them in real life. Pilot is underway with a sports team at Concordia, then will do the entire Freshman class. For the veteran project they are doing a market metric survey with 60 people from 40 different organizations who work with veterans. Purpose of the twenty-one questions are to identify what men need to get better, how, and what needs to happen in order to pay for it.  "Victory on the Home Front" event scheduled November 2 <sup>nd</sup> , at which five families (one from each branch of the military) will be recognized for their trauma experience, what they did to manage it, and how they are helping others now. There is an online nomination process at helpingmenheal.org. Winners receive a gold medal, vacation, and grocery/gas card.	More information available at helpingmen heal.org
