

Reducing Deaths and Injuries


Challenges

Multnomah County deaths per capita by census tract poverty rate


Poverty rate <15% = 4.4 deaths Poverty rate 15-25% = 8.8 deaths Poverty rate >25% = 10.2 deaths

Death rate 2.3X greater in higher poverty areas


Proposed Safety Distribution







Process for Selecting Our Streets Projects

Existing Plans

- High Crash Corridor Plans
- Safe Routes to School Plans
- East Portland in Motion
- Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Freight Plans
- Access to Transit Plans
- Additional outreach to neighborhoods and business groups

Best Practices

- Corridor Safety Improvements
- Safer crossings of unsignalized intersections
- Sidewalks
- Roadway design that minimizes conflicts between people walking, biking, driving

Key Projects 122nd Avenue Safety Improvements

- Filling sidewalk gaps
- New and improved crossings
- ADA access
- Striping and signal changes to improve transit efficiency
- Bus stop level improvements

Key Projects Improve Overall Neighborhood Safety

Safe Routes to School

- Since 2006, walking and biking trips up 35%
- 44% active trips

Neighborhood Greenways

- 2009 less that 25% residents within ½ mile
- 2014 more than 60% residents within ½ mile
