

Assessment: Voices & Data

From Latino Network focus group: A desire for employment and youth summer jobs.

One community leader said: "Law enforcement, GET, are respected by the gang members and their families for the most part. Other law enforcement who do not know the gang members or who treat them disrespectfully cause many more problems in the community."

One community leader said: "Barriers to jobs, caused by background checks needs to be addressed" Approximately 50% of gang involved youth indicated "obtaining a job" as a reason for leaving a gang.

A gang-involved individual said: "I think we as people need to have more things and jobs to keep them out of the streets or it's never going to stop."

A Parent & Family Survey respondent said: "Latino and black boys are targeted by gangs and also are underserved by schools." Approximately 50% of gang involved youth indicated "get into school or education" as a reason for leaving a gang

A gang-involved individual said: *"I have been blessed with positive influences and mentors that have helped guide me towards a new path."*

> A community leader said: "Services need to be delivered by people who have lived it. Mentors who come from a gang affiliated life and build trust, respect and relationship with youth to build pro-social options and accountability."

5 Strategies of the OJJDP Model

Links Between Police, Youth & Community

Promote opportunities for police and communities to build positive relationships by committing to:

- Improve police legitimacy by utilizing best available evidence, culturally responsive approaches and effective models for education.
- Support collaborative efforts to build empathy by addressing mutual fear, trauma and misperceptions.
- Create safe spaces for positive interaction and meaningful dialogue between police and youth to increase understanding and build trust.

Connection to Schools

Coordinate and leverage the efforts of multiple stakeholders to achieve better outcomes for youth.

- Connect with efforts which reduce disparities in school exclusion. Promote the expansion of restorative justice programs in schools.
- Support and enhance recommendations-regarding current school reconnection strategies to improve outcomes for gang impacted, affiliated and involved young people and those vulnerable to risk factors for gang involvement.
- Engage in state level advocacy to require teaching certification programs to include content on trauma informed and culturally responsive classrooms.

Employment Opportunities

Advocate for year-round access to developmentally and culturally responsive job readiness and placement in employment/internship, including a pool of employers and/or a social enterprise model, wraparound supports, and mentorship for the following populations:

- Youth experiencing risk factors for gang involvement
- Gang-involved youth who are ready to make a change
- Young people re-entering communities from state facilities

Family Engagement

Enhance efforts to protect families against risk factors for gang involvement and identify resources for stability, advocacy and mobilization through expanding the community health worker model and opportunities for meaningful engagement in policy-making for the following populations:

- Focus communities
- Low-income, first-time parents
- Families of gang affiliated youth

Mentoring

Ensure access to developmentally appropriate and culturally responsive mentors for young people through coordination of recruitment, training and support. These mentors will aid the following populations with re/connection with schools, higher education, training and employment opportunities:

- youth and families experiencing risk factors for gang involvement
- young people who are being influenced by gangs and gang-related activity
- young people re-entering communities from correctional facilities

Coordinated Entry

Coordinate entry from multiple systems of care and public safety using trauma-informed and data-driven decision making to:

- address root causes of violence in our community,
- intervene at the first sign of risk and respond effectively when violence does occur,
- repair, strengthen and restore our youth, families, and communities that have been affected by violence and
- reduce recidivism rates for our focus population.
