# REACH

## **Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health**

**WHAT?** REACH is a 3-year grant issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The goal is to improve health equity in chronic diseases for at least 75% of the local African-American/Black community.

WHY? African-American/Black communities of Multnomah County are plagued by health inequities from infancy through adulthood. Chronic disease prevention strategies and ongoing efforts are essential to increase health within these communities. We've heard from communities in the Portland-metro area that smoking addiction and lacking healthy food access are top barriers to living a healthy lifestyle. In many of our vulnerable communities, easy food options are often unhealthy, nearby convenience and retail stores don't carry sustainable foods and more nutritious options are often further away.

HOW? The REACH program uses communications, policy, system and environmental (PSE) change strategies to improve nutrition and decrease exposure to tobacco within the African-American/Black populations of Multnomah County. We work to impact the lives of infants, youth, adults and elders by integrating evidencebased changes into social and physical environments.







## Together, REACH staff and partners work in the areas of NUTRITION and TOBACCO:

- To bring improved access, transportation and food availability across 30 settings for more than 17,500 people.
- To increase the number of African-Americans/Blacks with access to tobacco/nicotine-free environments by 47,695.
