Introductions, Announcements, and Approval of Minutes

Abbey opened the meeting and previewed the agenda.

The October minutes were approved.

Abbey announced there is no January meeting.

Erika Preuitt introduced her new assistant, Stephanie Johnson.

Community Corrections Plan Approval

Abbey noted LPSCC is responsible for approving the Community Corrections Plan.

Erika Pruitt, Director of the Department of Community Justice (DCJ) gave an overview of the 2-year plan. DCJ receives about \$30 million to provide supervision and treatment to youth, adults, families, and communities. MCSO receives around \$16 million, LPSCC receives less than 1 million for administration. The board approved a rebalance of the budget to account for some of the reductions. There is work to do to correct the reduction during the legislative short session.

Director Pruitt stated recidivism rates are some of the lowest in the state; collaboration continues to grow; and the department continues to develop new programs. DCJ is committed to addressing racial & ethnic disparities.

Sheriff Reese thanked Erika and DCJ staff for the good work they do everyday for people under supervision.

The community corrections plan will go before the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners next week.

There were no objections.

Mental Health Court Changes

Judge Nan Waller stated for the first time, Mental Health Court will receive grant funding from the Criminal Justice Commission. This funding stream will allow the court to accept higher risk and need clients. Kristina Brightman will be the Mental Health Court coordinator. DCJ will be expanding its use of Court Coordination. The charter will be revised to reflect the acceptance of high risk/high need clients and to reflect 4 pillars for success (housing, social connection, relationship and purpose).

Other points included:

- There is not a full continuum of housing and services for people with mental health issues.
- Right now there are no dual-diagnosis programs.
- On the Aid & Assist side of the court:
 - Working towards a legislative fix.
 - Working with OHA to get more housing. (NW Re-entry beds are promising).
 - Encouraging OHA and hospitals to work towards a therapeutic non-jail option.
 - Hiring another CDAC for Aid & Assist.

MacArthur Safety & Justice Challenge Strategies and Updates

Abbey Stamp, Sarah Mullen, and Kyle Schwab gave an overview and updates of the MacArthur Safety & Justice Challenge strategies, Diane Wade House, and community engagement efforts.

Diane Wade House Update:

Monta Knudson reported the Diane Wade House had a reset last spring. Nike Greene consulted with Bridges to Change to think strategically about the population served and their needs. The result was a revised plan, and Deonica Johnson was hired to restructure programming.

Deonica noted the following additions:

- Women's empowerment workshop once a week
- Trauma care
- Money basics
- HEAT for women programming, which will be facilitated by Antoinette Edwards
- Rentwell classes
- OHSU health presentation
- MPD's expungement clinic

James Demry noted they are building relationships with DCJ and other community partners and looking at adding Moving On curriculum (which addresses criminality), and adding some self-care groups.

Kyle Schwab is establishing process measures, and there is a partnership with the National Center for Victims of Crime to develop a qualitative evaluation.

Helping women transition out of the house is a top goal. Monta noted next step housing would be beneficial.
