Executive Summary

This program offer funds a full-time deputy district attorney (DDA) specifically assigned to the screening, supervision, treatment and possible diversion of misdemeanor criminal cases that involve mentally ill offenders. This position collaborates with the existing felony Mental Health Court DDA for unified disposition and treatment services for multi-case offenders, and is specifically focused on connecting mentally ill misdemeanants to service providers while reducing overall iail bed usage.

Program Summary

The misdemeanor Mental Health Court DDA's efforts focus on connecting mentally ill misdemeanor offenders to service providers while reducing overall iail bed usage. To that end, the program/assigned DDA's work includes but is not limited to:

- Daily communication with the MCSO mental health navigator position to identify jail misdemeanants booked and flagged as mentally ill by a qualified screener at the jail. Review of all police/incident reports associated with persons flagged by the MCSO navigator.
- Weekly screening of all misdemeanor jail bookings to identify and flag persons held in custody on class B and C misdemeanor level offenses only. Screening of those persons for information relative to mental health concerns to include review of release/recog interviews and information, review of prior cases, and review of associated police/incident reports.
- Coordination with designated Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) program caseworkers for the intervention, diversion, release and transport of low level mentally ill offenders from jail directly to treatment providers.
- Screening of all misdemeanor cases/defendants appearing on the weekly Aid and Assist docket.

The misdemeanor mental health DDA will work closely with the MCSO mental health navigator to review all cases/persons identified by the navigator, and will make criminal issuing decisions based on information communicated by the navigator and the social service provider partners. Specifically, the DDA will be tasked with non-prosecution of misdemeanor cases involving mentally ill offenders who are willing to engage with social service providers immediately post-booking. The misdemeanor mental health DDA will also review jail data in an attempt to identify persons being held in custody on class B and C non-person misdemeanor offenses who suffer from mental illness, and who are willing to participate in social services. Specifically, the DDA will ask for direct release of these persons to LEAD caseworkers for the coordination and administration of social services, and later dismissal of criminal cases.

The misdemeanor mental health DDA will also personally screen all misdemeanor cases appearing on the weekly Aid and Assist docket for the purposes of ensuring overall minimal custody duration for defendants pending evaluations, and to further identify cases eligible for diversion to treatment providers and dismissal of criminal prosecutions.
