

 - Metro's Supportive Housing Services Program






System Crossover – 2018 Data






Impact of Tri-System Involvement






Impact of Health System + Bookings

Supportive Housing is the Pivot Point



\$3.6M in Medicaid Savings in 2018 if **862** people who were houseless were housed

People experiencing chronic homelessness (housed in PSH 365+ days)

People experiencing chronic homelessness (862 people not yet housed) \$10,188 Total Costs per Member in 2018



Racial Disparities Observed Across Communities


 Greatest disparities for people identifying as American Indian or Alaska Native
