Summary of how levy funds are helping your organization "protect the collection of Oregon history documents and artifacts, and public access to those." (taken from ballot language for Measure 26-118	As in previous years mentioned, we are in the process of building a museum here in East County. Excavation, foundation, sub flooring, end walls, grading and parking lot have been completed. (See attached photos) This museum and complex will be a destination point along the Historic Columbia River Hwy, since we are so close to the Vista House and Multnomah Falls, which sees over 1 million visitors each year creating a parking problem, we feel that the museum and complex will help alleviate some of the congestion. We plan that the museum will have about 70% displays and interpretation, 25% archival storage and 5% office space. The outside exhibits will highlight the industry and livelihood of Crown Point Country. As we near the completion of the building, more historical items from this area are being donated, therefore we needed more storage space, opting to purchase another storage container. We have installed shelving and lighting (by donation) and the second unit will also be remodeled to store more artifacts until the building is complete. We will be adding humidifiers to each unit. The storage containers will provide much needed fire protection also. Over the last twelve months, our volunteers have accessioned and archived over 500 items into our Past Perfect System, while at the same time upgrading our computer system to accommodate more volunteers and ready the system for the new museum. The upgrade was by a grant from Free Geek, with us purchasing a backup hard drive.

Oral interviews have continued with local Wasco Elder, Ken Smith. Ken is sharing the Indigenous Peoples stories, a well as identifying local sites and trails that were used in pre-contact times. New members have expressed a desire to interview members of Pioneer families of various ethnicities to document their life and times. CPCHS is working closely with the East Multnomah Pioneer Association to ready the journals for reprinting as well as the Society will continue to work with the local school children to learn their heritage.

It is an honor and we will continue to work with the Oregon Historical Society, the Levy Oversight Committee, the Multnomah County Commissioners and the Tax Supervising Conservation Commission. With the broad support of the community and partnership with community organizations, we are all working hard work to preserve and share the history of this area for many future generations.
