- Archaeological Investigations NW (AINW)
 volunteers spent MLK Day of Service with ECHO
 volunteers discovering historic items that had been
 stored under the floorboards of the Buttery building.
 AINW is completing the list of all the historic items
 found and the items will become part of the
 Zimmerman House collection.
- Volunteers filled a large dumpster with roofing materials and wood supports; the bulk of the bricks were saved and will be repurposed. ECHO also retained many of the best examples of various house trim and door pieces.

Other efforts included:

- We completed some restoration at the Zimmerman House including new window glass and support posts in the basement. One of our volunteers completed this work.
- We continued our weekly posts on our website and/or Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. This is done by one volunteer in concert with the company that manages our social media.
- The Levy funds were also used for a small storage unit that holds some of the Zimmerman House collection and some business materials.

Summary of how levy funds are being spent in a manner reflective of Multnomah County's diverse cultures.

- Work on a new exhibit at the Heslin House around the Japanese that lived in the area prior to World War II is underway. We have a variety of photographs and written stories from that time.
- We participated in the National Trust for Historic Preservation's effort to find "Where Women Made History". We submitted our three generations of Zimmerman women, which you can <u>find here</u>. At this time, there are only 6 stories from Oregon out of roughly 900 nationwide.

It has been such a relief to be able to focus on our mission and not worry if we could pay the utility bills! And the funding has been extra helpful this year as our museums remain closed due to Covid-19.

While it's been over nine years since the Levy began, we remain extremely grateful.
