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CHCB Budget Priorities: Health Equity Strategy

The CHCB specifically cites "advancing health equity" as a top priority for the Health Center Program.

In FY22, the health center program will launch the REGIONAL CENTERs of EXCELLENCE model supported by four health equity specialists:

- **ELEVATE** the community and patient voice to select top health priorities.
- MULTIDISCIPLINARY INTEGRATED APPROACH to improve health outcomes.
- ALIGN health improvement and outcomes initiatives (including metrics) with patient-directed priorities.
- Expand and support sustainable interventions for each region to ELIMINATE HEALTH DISPARITIES, ultimately improving ACCESS to CARE and HEALTH OUTCOMES.



Today's Health Center

Multnomah County's Community Health Center is the largest FQHC in Oregon. We provide care to all Multnomah County residents, including those who are low-income and uninsured.



Primary Care

Comprehensive primary care services at seven main locations, plus an additional specialty HIV clinic.

Behavioral Health

Access to behavioral health, including MAT services, is available in all main health center clinics.

Dental

Preventive and some specialty dental services are co-located at six of our main primary care sites, with an additional dental clinic specializing in services for persons experiencing homelessness. We also provide school dental services through fluoride varnish and well child dental care programs.

Student Health Centers

We offer comprehensive primary and mental health care services to all Multnomah County youth ages 5-18 at nine different schools. There are no out-of-pocket costs.



Pharmacy

Safe and effective medication therapy across the continuum, including clinical pharmacy services and mail order pharmacy services.

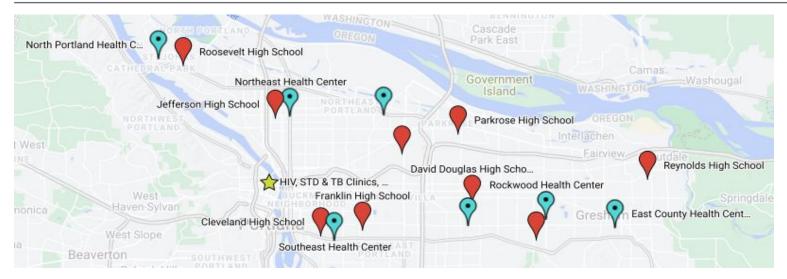


Wrap Around Support

As a community health center, we also provide all patients help with insurance enrollment, free interpretation, and access to other key programs designed to improve wellness. This includes: help with housing, transportation, and prescriptions for fruits/vegetables.

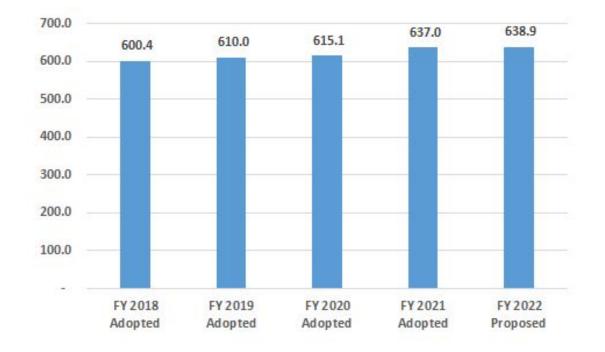

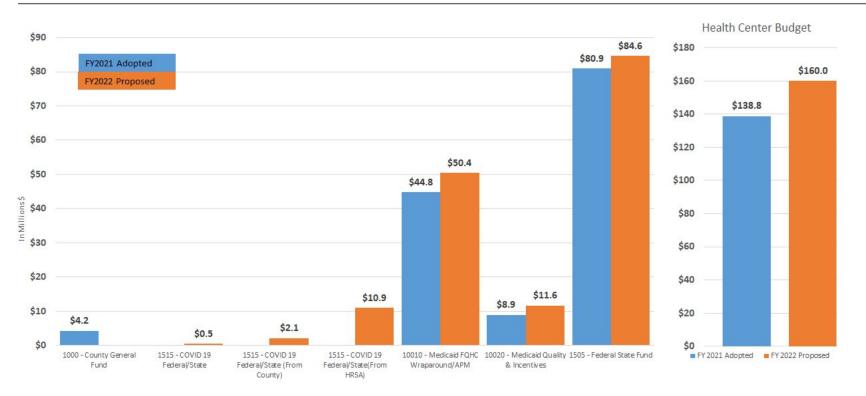
FTE – 5 Year Trend⁽¹⁾

Budget by Fund - \$160.0M⁽¹⁾ (Expenditures)

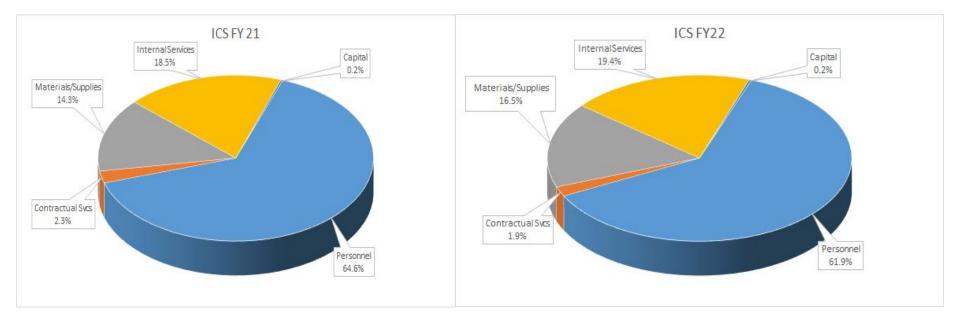

Budget by Category ⁽¹⁾

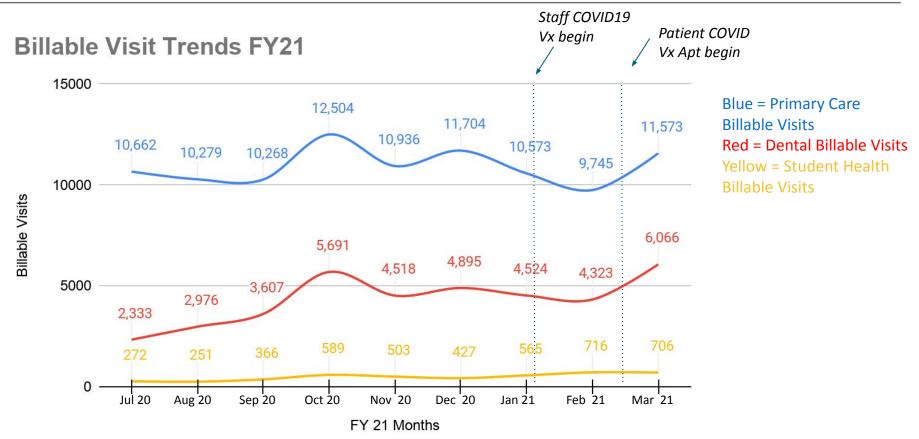

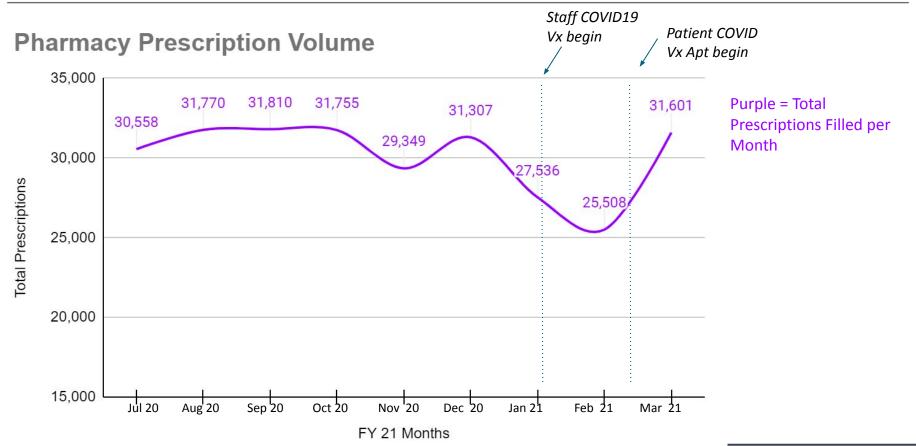

Funds will be used to help **increase infrastructure** and **infection prevention** so the health center program has **more flexibility** and **options** to treat patients **during and beyond** the pandemic. Example improvements include:

- Generators and universal power for critical machines and services
- Localized Vaccine Depots; i.e., upgraded vaccination freezers and tracking processes
- Negative Air Pressure rooms at more health center locations
