

Specialty Courts

Specialty courts are problem-solving courts that operate under a specialized model to provide court-directed supervision and mandated treatment to nonviolent individuals with substance use or mental health issues underlying their criminal behavior (Oregon Criminal Justice Commission)

Key Components and Essential Elements

Multnomah County Mental Health Court Program

- ♦ In operation for 13 years funded for the first time during the last biennium, 2019-2021
- Primary documented mental health diagnosis
- High risk/high needs
- Program capacity 80 participants
- 12-18 months

Mission

Divert people who are justice involved from incarceration and instead facilitate linkage to appropriate treatment and community resources

Goals

- Improve public safety
- Minimize recidivism
- Utilization of community resources
- Enhance collaboration between criminal justice agencies and community service providers
- Develop the right application of supervision to fit individualized need/ risk
- Meaningful inclusion of crime victims, defendants' family members, peers, advocates, and community members
- Improve QOL

CJC Grant

- CJC Funding 2109-2021, requested \$1.4M; awarded \$611K
- Prior In-Kind contributions totaled \$3,216,000
- Current Budget request estimated to be roughly \$1.1M (not finalized)
- Budget priorities: Coordinator; development of an in-house integrated BH treatment model; EDI evaluation; client supports; training
